Your Directors are pleased to present the 25th Annual Report together with the audited accounts of the Company for the year ended on March 31, 2011.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The gross Sales of your Company increased by 58.38% from Rs. 4,536.65 million in 2009-10 to Rs. 7,185.31 million in 2010-11. 9.64 million wheel rims were sold in 2010-11 as compared to 7.17 million wheel rims in the previous financial year. This corresponds to an increase of 34.41% in numbers of wheels. The comparatively higher increase in sales could be achieved thanks to the higher volumes of Exports, Truck and tractor wheels sold during the financial year under review.

The Earnings before interest and depreciation (EBITDA) increased by 42.21% from Rs. 622.49 million in 2009-10 to Rs. 885.25 million in 2010-11. The EBITDA margin has slightly decreased to 12.34% from 13.76% in 2009-10 due to increasing steel prices during the financial year under review.

A significant increase could be achieved in Profits before and after tax in 2010-11. They grew by 81.53% to Rs. 355.74 and by 105.18% to Rs. 298.02 million respectively.

The depreciation and other amortization increased to Rs. 328.05 million from Rs. 255.27 million due to the enhanced utilization of the Dappar and Oragadam plants and the commencement of commercial operations at Jamshedpur.

JAMSHEDPUR UNIT

Your directors are pleased to inform you that the Company's new Truck Wheel Rims Facility at Jamshedpur has commenced its commercial production during the year 2010-11. Tube type heavy commercial vehicle wheel rims are successfully being

supplied to Tata Motors and Tata DLT and soon also to Ashok Leyland. Moreover, tubeless wheel rim samples have been developed for two prominent German trailer manufacturers: Krone and Schmitz Cargobull. Keeping in view the projected production plan of Tata Motors, the Jamshedpur plant is currently enhancing its capacity to a level 1.7 million wheel rims.

DAPPAR UNIT

During 2010-11 your Company has furthermore added additional capacity at its Dappar plant. With this, the total installed capacity results enhanced from 7.50 million wheel Rims to 9.00 million wheel rims p.a.

ORAGADAM UNIT

The second phase expansion at Oragadam could be completed during the financial year under review and the same is under trial production. The total installed manufacturing capacity at Oragadam has thereby been increased from 2.5 million to 6.0 million wheel rims p.a.

MANUFACTURING CAPACITIES

During the financial year under review the total capacity of the Company has increased to 16 million wheel rims per annum which makes it one of the biggest steel wheel manufacturers in Asia.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

The focus of your Company is to develop world-class facilities for the manufacture of quality steel wheel rims for all segments of the automotive industry while increasing its customer base in India as well as internationally.

The growth of the automobile component industry is likely to slow down considerably in 2011-12 from the high growth rates of 26-30% seen during 2010-11. This is due to higher price of vehicles and rising interest rates. The expected growth rates for 2011-12 are expected to be around 8-10 percent in the domestic market and exports by around 70 percent. Further details regarding the future outlook of your Company are discussed in the Management Discussion and Analysis enclosed with the Annual Report.

ISSUE AND ALLOTMENT OF EQUITY SHARES ON PREFERENTIAL BASIS

Your Company issued and allotted 8,50,000 Equity Shares of Rs. 10/- each against cash, at a price of Rs. 520/- (Rupees Five hundred Twenty only) per equity shares i.e at a premium of Rs. 510/- per share to Sumitomo Metal Industries Ltd. on a preferential allotment basis on 9th December, 2010 (Non Promoter Category). Sumitomo Metal Industries Ltd. is a Japan based Company. The said 8,50,000 shares constitutes 5.73% of the total enhanced paid up capital of the Company as on 31st March,2011.

Your Company also issued and allotted 3,77,000 equity shares of Rs. 10/- each fully paid up, at a price of Rs. 595/- per shares (i.e. at a premium of Rs. 585/- per share) to GS Global Corp., on 12th January, 2011 on preferential allotment basis (Non Promoter Category). GS Global Corp is a South Korea based Company. The said 3,77,000 shares constitute 2.54% of the total enhanced paid up capital of the Company as on 31st March, 2011.

DIRECTORS

In accordance with the provisions of Companies Act, 1956, Sh. B. B. Tandon, Sh. S.S. Jha and Sh. S.S. Grewal will be retiring by rotation at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting and they are eligible for reappointment.

Mrs. Ute Mayr was re-appointed as a Whole time Director of the Company for a period of three years w.e.f 10.08.2011 subject to the approval of the Central Government.

DIVIDEND

Yours Directors are pleased to recommend a dividend of 15% (Rs. 1.50/- per share) for the year ended 31st March, 2011. The total cash outflow on account of the proposed dividend (incl. dividend tax) will be of Rs. 25.96 million (Previous year: 15.93 million), which represents 8.71% of the Profit after tax available for appropriation.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS

Your Company has adequate internal control procedures commensurate with its size and nature of business. These internal policies ensure efficient use and protection of the assets and resources, compliance with policies and statutes and ensure reliability as well as promptness of financial and operational reports.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Your Company is firmly committed to the principles of Good Corporate Governance and believes that statutory compliance and



transparency are necessary also to enhance the shareholder value.

A separate section on Corporate Governance forming part of the Directors' Report and a certificate from the Company's auditors, confirming the compliance with the Listing Agreement, is included in the Annual Report.

LISTING OF EQUITY SHARES

We are pleased to inform that the equity shares of the Company are listed on the National Stock Exchange and Bombay Stock Exchange, offering a wide trading network to the shareholders.

FIXED DEPOSITS

The Company has neither invited nor accepted any deposits from the public during the year. There are no unclaimed deposit(s) lying with the Company.

AUDITORS

M/s S.C. Dewan & Co., Chartered Accountants were appointed as Statutory Auditors of the Company to hold office till the conclusion of the ensuing Annual General Meeting. The Auditors retire at the ensuing Annual General Meeting and, being eligible, have offered themselves for re-appointment. The Company has received a certificate from them pursuant to Section 224 (IB) of the Companies Act, 1956, confirming their eligibility for reappointment.

INSURANCE

All properties and insurable interests of your Company including buildings and plant & machinery are adequately insured.

REPORT ON CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

A brief statement on Company's philosophy on code of governance:

Good governance practices stem from the culture and mindset of the organization. The governance is about outperforming sustainable organizations. 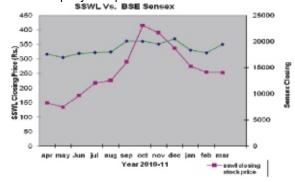

Discussion & Analysis

BUSINESS OVERVIEW

Manufacturing facilities and Product range

The Company manufactures steel wheels for the automotive industry. Its product range comprises steel wheels for Passenger cars, Multi utility vehicles (MUV), Tractors, Trucks, Light Commercial Vehicles (LCV), Heavy Commercial Vehicles (HCV), Off The Road Vehicles (OTR) as well as Two and Three Wheelers.

The Company has three manufacturing facilities strategically located in Dappar (near Chandigarh, North India), Oragadam (near Chennai, South India) and Jamshedpur (East India) in order to cater to the requirements of its Indian and international customers. 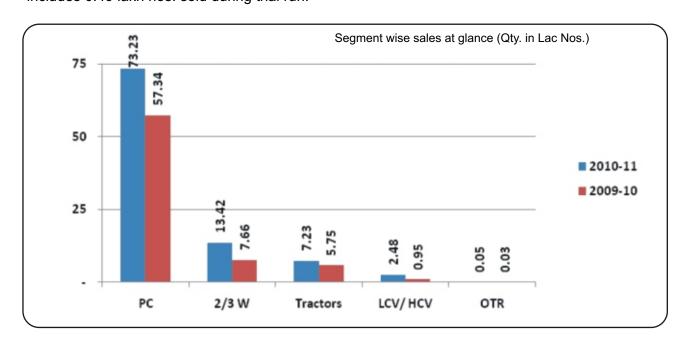
During the financial year 2010-11 the Company sold 96.41 lakh nos. of wheels as compared to 71.73 lakh nos. during 2009-10 and thereby registered an overall growth in sales of 34.41%.

The highest segment wise growth during the financial year under review was registered in the LCV/ HCV segment with 161.05% as compared to 2009-10, followed by 2/3W with 75.20%, OTR with 66.67%, PC with 27.71% and Tractors with 25.74% growth over last year.

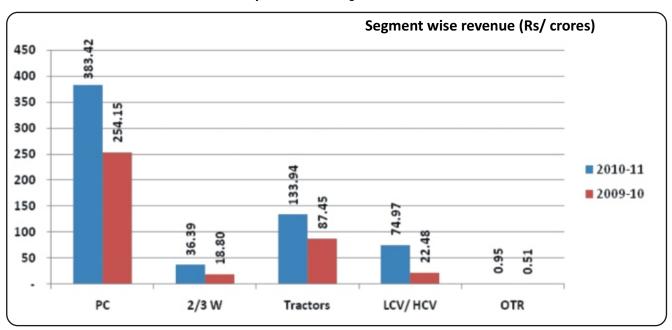

Total net sales have increased from 383.39 Crores Rs in 2009-10 to 629.67 Crores Rs in 2010-11 and marked a growth of 64.24%. It is worth pointing out that thanks to the enhancement of the Company's LCV/HCV capacities during the financial year under review the contribution to total net sales by the LCV/HCV segment has doubled to 11.91% in 2010-11.



EXPORTS ANALYSIS

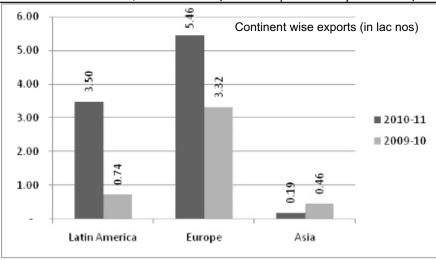

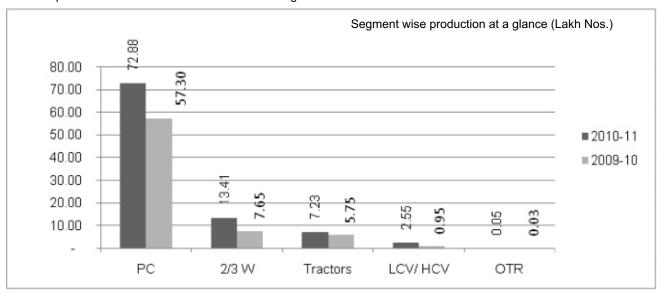
- Addition of production lines at Dappar in the PC and 2/3 W segments

Analysis of Major Expenditures

Raw Materials

The Raw Materials for the manufacturing of steel wheel rims comprise HR steel, tractor nuts and bolts and paints & chemicals. During the year 2010-11 the raw material cost amounted to 65% of net sales as against 64% of net sales in 2009-10 due to increase in cost of paints & chemicals and steel.

Manufacturing Expenses

The Manufacturing Expenses consist of power, fuel, spares and other consumables, repair and maintenance and other direct manufacturing expenses. These expenses amounted to 8% of net sales as against 7% in 2009-10 due to an overall increase in cost of inputs.

Personnel Expenses

The Company acknowledges and appreciates the contribution to its success by its employees. The Personnel cost remained at 5% of net sales during 2010-11.

Financial Expenses

The Financial Expenses accounted for 3% of net sales in 2010-11 as compared to 4% in 2009-10. Although interest on long term loans decreased in absolute terms, it remained at 1% of net sales. Interest on working capital loans increased in absolute and relative terms due to a higher utilization of working capital limits and increased interest rates. Interest on working capital amounted to 2% of net sales during 2010-11 as compared to 1% of net sales in 2009-10.

Selling Expenses

The Selling Expenses remained at 7% of net sales in spite of the Company's increased share of export business and across the board increase in transportation cost.

Strategic Investment

During 2010-11 the Company entered into two strategic investment agreements and received Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) of US\$ 15 million.

Sumitomo Metal Industries Ltd (SMI), Japan, invested US\$ 10 million in December 2010. SMI holds 5.73% equity of the Company as of March 31, 2011. SMI is one of the World's leading steel makers - Sumitomo Group, having 400 years of manufacturing history founded SMI in 1897. SMI manufactures steel products broadly classified as pipes and tubes, steel sheets (auto), plates (energy and shipbuilding), structural sheets (construction) and railway, automotive and machinery parts. In addition to its manufacturing facilities in Japan, SMI is establishing a seamless pipe plant in Brazil, a steel sheet manufacturing unit in Vietnam and a forged crankshaft and steel sheet business in India. In 2009 SMI achieved a turnover of 1,285 billion JPY (9.6 billion EUR). It employs 24,000 employees worldwide. The Company has a past and continuing relationship with SMI through its wholly-owned subsidiary Ringtechs Co. Ltd (RTCL). RTCL is providing highly valued technical expertise to the Company since 1997 within the terms of a technical collaboration agreement.

GS Global Corporation (GGSC) (formerly known as SsangYong Corporation), South Korea invested US\$ 5 million in January 2011. GSGC holds 2.54% equity of SSWL as of March 31, 2011. GSGC is part of GS Group, ranked as one of the top 10 private business houses in South Korea. GSGC operates as a trading house dealing in steel and metal products, cement, energy, petrochemical, machinery, logistic services and more. Apart from GSGC the GS Group's business comprises refinery (GS Caltex), power (GS EPS), retail (GS Retail), engineering and construction (GS E&C) and sports (GS Sports). In 2010 GSGC's turnover was 1.2 billion USD (0.9 billion EUR). The turnover of GS Group had crossed 45 billion USD in the same year (around 34 billion EUR). The Company has past and continuing relationship with GSGC as an importer of HR Steel Coils from South Korea through GSGC.

Industry Overview

The automobile industry is one of the fastest growing sectors in India. The increase in the demand of cars and other vehicles, powered by the increase in incomes, is the primary growth driver of India's automobile industry. The introduction of tailor made finance and easy repayment schemes have further enhanced this growth scenario.

As per data released by SIAM India, the automobile industry witnessed a growth of 27.45% in production during 2010-11 (17.92 million nos vehicles as compared to 14.06 million nos vehicles during the previous year) which is the highest since 2004-05. Four wheelers witnessed a growth of 27.87% with 3.74 million nos as compared to 2.92 million nos during 2009-10 and two and three wheelers witnessed a growth of 27.34% with 14.18 million nos as compared to 11.13 million nos during 2009-10. In four wheelers, the commercial vehicles production, outperformed with a 32.63% growth (0.75 million nos during 2010-11 as compared to 0.57 million nos during 2009-10). Sales in the export market recorded a growth of 29.64% during 2010-11 with a 7.86% growth in four wheelers and a 37.79% growth in two and three wheelers. In four wheelers, commercial vehicles outperformed with a 69.51% growth and 0.076 million nos as compared to 0.045 million nos during 2009-10.

The Indian tractor industry is still relatively young (since 1961) but has by now become the largest in the world. Higher productivity and greater output are the two major reasons for the mechanization in the agriculture sector, a significant contributor to India's GDP. The tractor penetration level in India is still very low as compared to world standards. Besides the conventional use of tractors in agriculture there is a vast market for them also in the infrastructure industry. For these reasons the tractors sales recorded an impressive growth of 23.80% also during 2010-11 with 0.545 million nos as compared to 0.440 million nos during 2009-10. The Company could maintain its market share during the financial year under review.

STRENGTHS OF THE COMPANY

R&D Capabilities

The Company is recognized by the Govt. of India as a Research & Development centre and equipped with most state of the art designing capabilities in terms of technology and equipment. Its engineers are dedicated to designing wheel rims for customers across the world and strongly focused on value engineering of existing products with the aim of optimizing their cost. Our tool room is equipped with most modern machineries and testing equipment. The Company enjoys an excellent reputation with its customers due to its innovative design, valuable inputs and fast development of tools.



The commercial life of a wheel is increased by enhancing it in some way i.e. giving it extra features, improving its performance, changing its appearance, or making it cheaper to produce, etc. It helps the company to keep the product ahead of the competition and spreads the large capital outlay associated with developing products over a longer period.

In the recent past, SSWL has designed and developed a high tech styled steel wheel for Renault which successfully substituted an alloy wheel.

QUALITY AND TECHNICAL COLLABORATION

The Company is committed to deliver steel wheels that comply with the highest quality and safety standards. The ISO/TS-16949:2002 quality management system requirements for the design, development and production of its products have been successfully implemented in 2004. Thanks to its technical collaboration with Ring Techs Co Ltd., Japan (a 100% subsidiary of Sumitomo Metals Ltd., Japan), the Company has achieved technical world class excellence over the past decade.

MANAGEMENT'S CONCERN WITH REGARD TO ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL STANDARDS

With regard to Environmental, Health and Safety as well as Social Management the Company complies with World Bank standards: its integral management systems are certified in accordance with ISO 14001:2004, OHSAS 18001:2007 and SA8000:2008.

The Company is currently engaged in extending above mentioned certifications to all three plants.

HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

Human assets are a vital factor for the success of an organization and the Company highly appreciates the valuable contribution by its Personnel and strives to steadily improve its HR policies in order to recruit and retain the talent required to lead the growth process and become a preferred workplace for its employees at all levels.

BUSINESS STRATEGY

It is the main aim of the Company to sustain its growth momentum vis-à-vis the growth in the automobile sector and maintain and consolidate its position as a leading manufacturer in its sphere. We intend to achieve substantial growth in future by implementing the following strategy:

Increase in share of sales in Tractors segment

Tractor wheel rims contribute more to EBITDA margins and accordingly the Company has strengthened its manufacturing facilities to increase its share in this segment. It has added and/or suitably modified/upgraded its existing manufacturing facilities which are now capable of producing 55,000 tractor wheel sets per month as against 35,000 sets per month in the past.

Increase in share of sales in LCV/ HCV segment

The Company's unit at Jamshedpur is dedicated to the manufacture of wheel rims for HCV. This unit has commenced commercial production in March 2011 and has an installed capacity of 1.00 million per annum. The existing installed capacity of 1.00 million will be enhanced to 1.7 million by January, 2012. This unit can produce wheel rims of both kinds: tube type and tube less type.

Increase in share of business with existing customers and increase in overall customer base

The Company presently maintains a respectable share of business with all its customers. Emphasis is given to increase its present share of business with its existing customers in order to attain advantages of volumes. The Company moreover endeavors to establish a new customer base within and outside India on a continuous basis.

FOCUS ON THE EXPORT MARKET

Having achieved substantial success in the domestic market, the company has started tapping the vast export market. A modest beginning was made during the year 2005-06 and since then exports are steadily growing. The company has received large

orders from leading car manufacturers like PSA Peugeot Citroen, Renault, Audi and BMW from Europe and Kubota Tractors from Asia and is in active discussions with other car manufacturers in Europe, Asia and South America for their various projects. During 2010-11, the Company has furthermore bagged a significant order of aftermarket export wheels from ETOP, Slovakia.

FUTURE OUTLOOK AND BUSINESS PLAN

India not only emerged relatively unscathed from the global financial crisis of 2008, but has returned to its trend growth rate in 2010-11. Driven by the inherent strength of its domestic demand, which was suitably complemented by the Reserve Bank of India's monetary management and the Central government's fiscal stimulus, India's GDP is expected to grow by 8.6 per cent in 2010-11 as per the CSO Advanced Estimate. This will again make India one of the fastest growing economies in the world.

The growth of the automobile component industry is likely to moderate to single digits in 2011-12 from the high growth rates of 26-30% seen during 2010-11. This is due to higher prices of vehicles and rising interest rates. The company expects to grow its export business by at least 70 percent in numbers and the truck wheel business by a minimum of 50 percent. The tractor wheel business is expected to be up by 25 percent.

The Union Budget 2011-12 has proposed to extend the excise duty refund available to taxis having a seating capacity of less than 7 and to other vehicles having a seating capacity of up to 13 passengers. This is expected to marginally aid the sales of utility vehicles in the specified category. Also, the concessional excise duty of 10 per cent has been extended to vehicles based on fuel cell and hydrogen cell technology, which will improve the long term growth prospects of these vehicles.

Specified parts of hybrid vehicles have been exempted from basic customs duty and special CVD in the budget. In addition, excise duty on these parts has been reduced to 5 per cent from 10 per cent earlier, in order to incentivize domestic production and reduce import dependence. These factors are expected to aid the sales of hybrid vehicles and have a marginally positive impact on the passenger cars industry over the longer term.

The increase in exemption limits of tax slabs for individual tax payers from Rs. 1.60 lakh to Rs. 1.80 lakh is likely to lead to increase in disposable incomes of addressable households, and thus aid two-wheeler sales.

Enhancement of interest subvention on crop loans from 2 to 3 per cent, revision of wage rates under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (NREGA) scheme and increased allocation towards rural development projects like Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana are expected to have a marginally positive impact on two-wheeler and tractor sales. Moreover, announcement of the launch of the 'National Mission for hybrid and electric vehicles' is expected to benefit sales of hybrid and electric vehicles over the longer term.

All the above factors are likely to have a positive impact on the demand of our products in future.

The company hopes to cope with these challenges with its continued focus on cost control, process efficiencies and product innovations.

NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

i) Accounting Convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Accounting Standards referred to in sub-section (3C) of Section 211 of the Companies Act 1956 and relevant presentational requirements of the Companies Act, 1956.

ii) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost (net of CENVAT) less accumulated depreciation. Cost of acquisition is inclusive of freight, duties, taxes and other incidental expenses and interest on loan taken for the acquisition of qualifying assets up to the date of commissioning of assets.

The exchange differences arising on reporting of long term foreign currency monetary items at rates different from those at which they were initially recorded during the period, or reported in previous financial statements, in so far as they relate to the acquisition of a depreciable capital asset, have been added to or deducted from the cost of the asset and shall be depreciated over the balance useful life of the asset

Die Tooling, developed in-house, includes cost of material, taxes and duties and other direct/ incidental expense on in-house development.

iii) Depreciation/amortization

- Depreciation on fixed assets (other than those referred to in b and c below) is provided on straight line method in accordance with Schedule XIV to the Companies Act, 1956.
- Depreciation on assets costing Rs. 5,000 or less is provided 100% on prorata basis for days put in use.
- c. The leasehold land is amortized over the period of lease.
- d. Difference of Exchange Rate fluctuation on imported plant and machineries procured out of long term foreign currency loans is amortized over the residual life of relevant plant and machineries.

iv) Inventories

- Raw materials lying at Factory and job workers have been valued at cost.
- Stocks in process have been valued at Raw material cost plus proportionate of conversion cost.
- Finished goods lying at factory have been valued at Raw material cost plus conversion cost including excise duty payable.
- d. Scrap has been valued at net realizable value.
- e. Stores and Spares have been valued at cost.

v) Investments

Long-term investments are carried at cost less provision, if any, for diminution in value which is other than temporary. Current investments are carried at lower of cost and fair value.

vi) Transactions in Foreign Currency

- i) Foreign currency transactions are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing as at the date of transactions except export sales which are recorded at a rate notified by the customs for invoice purposes. Such rate is notified in the last week of the month and is adopted for recording export sales of the next month. The exchange fluctuation arising as a result of negotiation of export bill is accounted for as difference in exchange rates.
- Monetary items denominated in a foreign currency are reported at the closing rate as at the date of balance sheet. The reinstatement difference is charged to profit and loss account.
- Non-monetary items (fixed assets and loans) denominated in a foreign currency are reinstated as at the date of balance sheet. The difference

on re-instatement is carried to relevant non-monetary items.

vii) Employee Benefits

The Company has various schemes of retirement benefits such as provident fund, gratuity and leave encashment, which is dealt with as under

- Contributions to provident fund are made in accordance with the provisions of Employees' Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 and are charged to revenue every year.
- ii) Provision for Gratuity is made based on actuarial valuation. The gratuity liability in respect of employees of the Company is covered through a policy taken by a trust from Life Insurance Corporation of India. The contribution towards premium of the policy to the trust is charged to revenue every year.
- iii) Provision for leave encashment is made based on actuarial valuation. The leave encashment liability is covered through a policy taken from Life Insurance Corporation of India. The contribution towards premium of the policy is charged to revenue every year.

viii) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs that are attributable to acquisition or construction of a qualifying asset are capitalized as part of cost of such assets. Qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use. All other borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

ix) Cenvat

The balance in the Service Tax and Modvat account is shown as current asset.

x) Revenue Recognition

Sales revenue is recognized as and when goods are handed over to carrier.

- Insurance claim is recognized on actual receipt basis.
- Interest from bank is recognized on accrual basis.

xi) Recognition of expenses

Expenses are recognized on accrual basis except Technical know-how fees and Royalty on sales which is recognized on cash basis.

xii) Impairment of Assets

At each balance sheet date an assessment is made whether any indication exists that an asset has been impaired. If any such indication exists, an impairment loss, i.e., the amount by which the carrying amount of asset exceeds its recoverable amount is provided in the books of account.

xiii) Accounting for taxes on income

Provision for taxation for the year is ascertained on the basis of assessable profits computed in accordance with the provisions of the Income-tax Act, 1961.

Deferred tax is recognized, subject to the consideration of prudence, on timing differences, being the difference between taxable income and accounting income that originates in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods. In respect of carry forward of losses and unabsorbed depreciation, deferred tax assets are recognized based on virtual certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax asset can be

- 20. As per the provision of Section 115JAA, MAT Credit receivable has been recognized as an asset to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal Income Tax during the specified period. - 23. The company is in the business of manufacture and sale of wheel rims and there is no other segment as per Accounting Standard (AS -17) dealing with the segment reporting.
- 24. Land for Oragadam plant is obtained on 99 years lease basis from State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamilnadu Limited (SIPCOT), a Govt of Tamilnadu enterprise. Total cost of leasehold land is amortized over a period of 99 years. Accordingly a sum of Rs. 12.19 lakh (previous year Rs. 42.68 lakh) is amortized during the year.
