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# Gangetic plains, Midnapore hold key to LS polls in Bengal

With the stage set for yet another political showdown between Mamata Banerjee's Trinamool Congress and the opposition BJP, two regions - Gangetic plains and Midnapore - seem to hold the key to the state's action-packed electoral battle. The Jalpaiguri region in North Bengal and the Matua belt in south Bengal are also important in the political landscape of the state. The Lok Sabha polls in West Bengal, comprising 42 seats, will take place in seven phases, from April 19 to June 1. Counting is on June 4. Out of the 42 seats, 10 are reserved for SC candidates and two for ST. In the 2019 Lok Sabha polls, the TMC won 22 seats, the Congress (2) and the BJP (18). The Gangetic plain region, which comprises five districts of North and South 24 Parganas, Kolkata, Howrah, and Hooghly, has 16 Lok Sabha seats out of which the BJP had won just three in the last Lok Sabha polls. The TMC, which is known for its political dominance of this region, sensing anti-incumbency and non-performance of its candidates, this time has brought in new aspirants in six seats - three, two, and one respectively from North 24

Parganas, South 24 Parganas, and Hooghly. The TMC had swept the two districts of 24 Parganas in the 2021 assembly polls when the party had bagged 27 of the 33 seats in North 24 Parganas, and all but one seat in the minority-dominated South-24 Parganas. It had also made a clean sweep by winning all the assembly seats in Kolkata, Howrah, and all but four in the Hooghly district. Although the TMC has announced its candidates for all Lok Sabha seats in the state, the BJP announced candidates for only twenty seats and the Left Front, which is still in talks with the Congress for an alliance, has announced candidates for sixteen seats. The saffron party, which had made the citizenship law one of its poll planks during the last general election, was able to woo a section of the refugees, especially those from the Matua community, and the Bongaon Lok Sabha seat subsequently fell on its lap. The BJP anticipates positive outcomes from the implementation of the CAA, while the TMC seeks to exploit the confusion surrounding it. The TMC is concerned about the arrests of its senior ministers and alleged influential figures who managed organization



and election affairs in South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas, and Kolkata. Jyoti Priya Mallick, responsible for North 24 Parganas, and Partha Chatterjee, overseeing party affairs in Kolkata and Hooghly, have been detained by central agencies due to their alleged involvement in scams. Adding to their woes, the arrest of Arabul Islam, a prominent leader in Bhargore, and Shajahan Sheikh, currently in CBI custody for charges of sexual violence and land grabbing in the Sandeshkhali area with-

The balance of power in the region shifted in favour of BJP following Suwendu Adhikari's switch in 2021, despite TMC's resurgence and strengthened influence through welfare schemes targeted at tribal Kurmi and Mahato communities. The Jangalmahal region witnessed unrest last year as members of the Kurmi community, which is a deciding factor in three seats, staged protests and blockades, advocating for ST status. Both BJP and TMC have been treading cautiously with the ruling party forming a state Tribal Development Board and nominating a member of Mahato and Kurmi from two of the seats in the region. Adding to BJP's woes, Kunar Hembram, a sitting MP from Jhargram seat, quit the party last week citing personal reasons. The Jalpaiguri region, recognised as the hills and foothills of the state, consists of five districts - Alipurduar, Cooch Behar, Darjeeling, and Jalpaiguri, where the BJP won all the four Lok Sabha seats. The region has become a stronghold of BJP since the 2019 LS elections, capitalising on discontentment among the populace regarding a feeling of alienation in North Bengal and calls for separate statehood and Union Territory status.

Although several of the BJP leaders had openly called for carving out a Union Territory from the North Bengal region, the TMC has gone to the town accusing the saffron camp of dividing the state. The lack of effectiveness displayed by BJP MPs from the area is concerning, although the commitment to implementing the CAA in bordering districts is expected to be advantageous for the party. In the Matua belt of Bengal, apart from Bongaon, the two seats of Nadia district, - Ranaghat and Krishnanagar, the CAA is likely to have an impact as both seats have a considerable Matua population. In Nadia, the BJP had won whereas TMC's Mahua Moitra bagged the Krishnanagar seat. The BJP has nominated sitting MP Jagannath Sarkar from Ranaghat, whereas the TMC has pitted BJP MLA Mukut Mani Adhikari, who switched camps recently. It has renominated Moitra, who was expelled from Lok Sabha in a cash-for-quarry case, from the seat. Political analyst Biswanath Chakraborty thinks control over Gangetic Plains will be the key to elections. "With 16 seats, this region holds the key. And TMC has an advantage as BJP lacks strong organisation in the area," he said.

# NPP to support BJP candidates in Arunachal Pradesh, says Conrad

Meghalaya Chief Minister Conrad K Sangma said on Sunday that his National People's Party (NPP) would not field any candidates in the two Lok Sabha seats in Arunachal Pradesh and support the BJP nominees. The NPP is a part of the BJP-led NDA at the Centre. "The National People's Party has decided not to contest the two Lok Sabha seats in Arunachal Pradesh. Being partners in the NDA, the NPP National Committee has decided to support NDA candidates in Arunachal Pradesh and has directed its State Committee to extend support to the NDA candidates," Sangma posted on X. Hailing Sangma's decision, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said such commitment of NDA partners will ensure over 400 seats in the Lok Sabha elections for the ruling alliance. "Such unparalleled commitment among our partners will ensure the NDA under the leadership of Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri



@narendramodi Ji secures over 400 seats. Thank you so much Shri @SangmaConrad Ji," Sarma posted on X. The BJP has named Union Earth Sciences Minister Kiren Rijiju for the Arunachal West Lok Sabha seat and Tapir Gao as its candidate for the Arunachal East seat. Polling will be held in the two seats in the first phase on April 19. The NPP, which leads the ruling coalition in Meghalaya, had won five seats in the last assembly elections in Arunachal Pradesh.

# Rahul a liability for INDIA Bloc: BJP leader Mukhtar

Senior BJP leader Mukhtar Abbas Naqvi feels Congress leader Rahul Gandhi is the biggest liability of the opposition bloc and warned that several opposition parties could risk losing recognition from the Election Commission after defeat at the hands of the Narendra Modi-led BJP in the upcoming Lok Sabha polls. The former Union minority affairs minister tried to dispel fears revolving around the implementation of CAA by saying, "Not a single Indian citizen, including Muslims, would be affected by the new legislation" and accused the opposition of trying to create communal conflict and confusion across the country. In an interview to PTI, Naqvi predicted a decisive victory for the BJP government for a third consecutive term, citing a widespread loss of faith among the populace in opposition parties, particularly the Congress. He criticised opposition bloc INDIA, saying it lacks coherent leadership and policies, with internal conflicts and ambitions hindering its effectiveness. "INDIA bloc is a challenge for their allies and not the BJP. There is a lot of conflict and confusion among them as



there is neither any leadership nor any clear policy. Everybody has prime ministerial ambition. People don't want a remote-controlled government by the Congress, which is the biggest ally. It has no visibility on the ground," he said. Regarding the leadership crisis within the opposition, Naqvi singled out Rahul Gandhi as a liability for the INDIA bloc, suggesting that the opposition's frustration is evident in their rhetoric. He said, "Rahul Gandhi is a liability of the opposition bloc INDIA. Now, their depression over imminent defeat is visible through their abuses which reflect their frustration. INDIA bloc in no way is a challenge to the BJP." Naqvi suggested that post-election, several political parties may struggle to maintain their recognition due to low vote counts. He said, "The mood of the nation is very clear that they will defeat those political parties which are creating hurdles in the path of good governance." "Several political parties after the Lok Sabha polls will make rounds to the Election Commission to protect their recognition (as the votes garnered will be so less than the prescribed norms for having recognition)," he added.

# BJP foothold in Chhattisgarh makes it uphill task for Congress

The ruling BJP in Chhattisgarh has fared exceedingly well against the Congress in all four parliamentary elections held after the state's formation in 2000, and is expected to improve its tally of 2019, when it won 9 of the 11 seats in the state. Issues pertaining to farmers, tribals, mining, infrastructure and employment, apart from the 'Modi factor' are likely to play a role in the poll outcome in the state, which is divided into northern, central and southern regions on the basis of topography. Tribals comprise 32 per cent of Chhattisgarh's population, and around 70 per cent people of the state are involved in agriculture and allied activities. The BJP has declared candidates for all 11 seats. Brijmohan Agrawal, currently minister in the Vishnu Deo Sai-led state government, and two sitting MPs are among the BJP candidates. The Congress

has so far announced candidates in six seats, pinning hopes on senior leaders, including former chief minister Bhupesh Baghel. The BJP won 10 out of the 11 Lok Sabha seats in 2004, 2009 and 2014. Despite a severe loss in the 2018 state assembly elections, it bagged 9 seats in the 2019 Lok Sabha polls. NORTH CHHATTISGARH: This tribal-dominated region comprises Surguja, Raigarh (both reserved for Scheduled Tribe candidates) and Korba Lok Sabha seats, each covering eight assembly segments. The region has dense forests, hills, water reservoirs and is home to some indigenous tribal communities. People are dependent largely on agriculture and non-timber forest produce for livelihood. The region, also having many coal mines, shares border with Odisha, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh. Human-elephant conflicts and protests by coal mine projects-affected people have been



key issues in the region. Another factor is the influence of the erstwhile royal families of Surguja and Jashpur. The BJP won all the eight assembly seats under Surguja Lok Sabha constituency in the last polls. In the 2019 Lok Sabha elections, BJP's Renuka Singh won this seat and became minister at the Centre. She later successfully contested the 2023 state assembly polls. This time, the BJP has fielded former MLA Chintamani Maharaj from Surguja. He had quit the Congress before the last assembly polls. Raigarh is the home turf of CM Sai, who represented this par-

liamentary seat in 1999, 2004, 2009 and 2014. In 2019, BJP's Gomti Sai won this seat. She was elected to the Chhattisgarh assembly last year. The BJP has this time fielded Radheshyam Rathiya, a fresh face. The saffron party has not lost these two Lok Sabha seats since the formation of Chhattisgarh. Korba seat is currently held by Congress' Jyotsumba Mahant, who has been re-nominated by the party. The BJP has fielded its influential woman leader Saroj Pandey in this seat. CENTRAL CHHATTISGARH: It comprises six Lok Sabha seats - Raipur, Durg, Rajnandgaon, Mahasamund, Bilaspur, and Janjgir-Champa. This region shares borders with Odisha, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra. Due to a large number of rice varieties grown in the state's central plains, it is also known as the 'paddy bowl'. Raipur, Durg and Bilhai areas account for almost half of the total urban population of the state. Farmer-related issues and employment play a dominant role in determining the poll outcome in this region. During the previous assembly polls, the BJP also campaigned on the Hindutva issue here. Janjgir-Champa Lok Sabha seat (reserved for Scheduled Caste candidates) has eight assembly segments, all won by the Congress in the last assembly polls. The party also won five of the eight assembly segments under Rajnandgaon.

# Teachers Recruitment Exam: 270 aspirants detained for paper leak

The Economic Offences Unit (EOU) of Bihar Police has detained over 270 aspirants in Jharkhand's Hazaribagh district in connection with an alleged paper leak of Bihar Public Service Commission's (BPSC) Teachers Recruitment Exam (TRE)-3. According to a statement issued by the EOU here on Saturday, acting on a tip-off unit's sleuths conducted searches at several locations in

Hazaribagh on March 14 and 15 and found that aspirants of TRE-3, who had been brought from several places in Bihar, had been supplied question papers. "On the day of the examination, March 15, candidates were supposed to leave at around 3 am for their respective exam centres. They all were detained and on the basis of their interrogation, officials managed to nab certain members of the gang involved in the paper leak," the statement said.

# 21 more fishermen held by Sri Lanka, TN seeks action

Chennai: The Tamil Nadu unit of BJP and the PMK on Sunday flagged the arrest of 21 more fishermen by Sri Lanka and urged the Centre to swiftly secure the release of fishers and their boats. Tamil Nadu BJP President K Annamalai and PMK top leader Anbumani Ramadoss said 21 fishermen have been arrested by the island nation. Also, their two boats have been seized. The fishermen were arrested on the night of March 16 by Lankan authorities. PTI

# LS polls: South Karnataka bracing up for battle

The Vokkaliga heartland of the old Mysuru region consisting of several southern districts will be the testing ground for the recently forged BJP-JD(S) alliance in Karnataka in the Lok Sabha polls. The ruling Congress will now look to consolidate its gains that it made in the assembly elections in May last year when it made inroads into the strongholds of the regional party headed by former Prime Minister H D Deve Gowda in these districts. In the 2019 Parliamentary elections, the Congress and JD(S) fought together but secured only one seat each in the state. The BJP bagged 25 out of the total 28 Lok Sabha seats. The Congress and JD(S) win, in fact, came in the old Mysuru region - Bangalore Rural and Hassan, respectively, while Mandya seat went to an independent backed by the BJP. This time, the JD(S) has an alliance with BJP. According to sources, the JD(S) is likely to be allotted Hassan, Mandya and Kolar seats in the region, from where Deve Gowda's party draws its strength from in Karnataka.



The JD(S) is now looking to bounce back after the drubbing it received in the May assembly polls. The Congress and JD(S) are considered to be traditional rivals in the region, where the BJP has also been improving its vote-share. The BJP-JD(S) alliance hopes to counter the Congress' surge in the region, determined to consolidate Vokkaliga votes in their favour and banking on the Modi charisma. Both parties also hope to gain from each other with this alliance. The Congress is hoping to further its prospects and continue its dom-

inance in the region, with the help of its strong local leadership and riding on its five guarantee schemes. Both Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and Congress state President D K Shivakumar, who is also the Deputy Chief Minister come from this region, and so does JD(S) patriarch Deve Gowda and his son H D Kumaraswamy, a former CM and that party's state President. According to a political analyst, "coordination among local leaders and transfer of votes between the parties are going to be key for the BJP-JD(S) alliance to click."

Sharpening his attack on the opposition, the Rajya Sabha member said that the "election season is forcing even the opposers of Lord Ram and Sanatan Dharma to chant 'Ram Ram'." "SP leaders who opened fire on Ram devotees are now building a temple in Etawah," the BJP leader said. Mulayam Singh Yadav's hometown is Safai in Etawah district of Uttar Pradesh. In an apparent reference to Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, Sharma said, "Nowadays, a former Congress president puts sandalwood powder on his forehead, but wonders why people are looking up to Modi."

# Opposition parties have come together because of Modi phobia: Dinesh

Rajya Sabha member Dinesh Sharma on Sunday said opposition parties which are trying to put up a facade of unity for the Lok Sabha poll will be fighting each other after three months. Due to their inflated egos and poor performance in the election, they will not be able to "choose even a leader of the opposition (in the Lok Sabha) from amongst themselves", the BJP leader and former Uttar Pradesh deputy chief minister told PTI in an interview. The Lok Sabha poll was announced by the Election Commission on Saturday and it

will be held in seven phases - April 19, April 26, May 7, May 13, May 20, May 25 and June 1. Counting of votes will be held on June 4. Sharma claimed that opposition parties are not in the election scene anywhere this time. Even the southern states will witness the sunset of opposition parties and the rise of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in this election, Sharma asserted. "Some opposition parties have come together for the Lok Sabha election. But due to inflated egos of their leaders, they won't be able to select the leader of opposition from amongst themselves," said the



MP, who recently toured some southern states, including Tamil Nadu where the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK), a member of the opposition INDIA bloc, is in power. The bloc was formed by some opposition parties, including the Congress, the Aam Aadmi Party, the Samajwadi Party (SP) and the Trinamool Congress, to take on the BJP in the election. They have come together due to "Modi phobia", Sharma said and exuded confidence that the BJP and its allies will win the Lok Sabha poll with more than 400 seats. The third term of Prime Minister Narendra Modi will be full of great

possibilities, he said. Sharma also hit out at SP chief Akhilesh Yadav for comparing Prime Minister Modi with Adolf Hitler. "The real Hitler was the one who opened fire on 'karsevaks' in Ayodhya, and during whose time, people who talked about the Ram temple (in Ayodhya) were jailed," Sharma said in an apparent reference to SP founder, the late, Mulayam Singh Yadav's government. "If they love Hitler so much, then they should also remember the Emergency imposed by their ally Congress and the anti-Sikh riots," he said.
