Airlifts toddler with kidney failure from Raipur to Bengaluru

A 6 months old baby experienced Diarrhea while the family returned from **Canada**. Diarrhea worsened the kidney functions.

The infant was diagnosed with Haemolytic Uremic Syndrome(HUS), a medical condition presents with high blood pressure and kidney failure.

Our team promptly responded to the parents' request to airlift the infant and stabilized the baby at the local hospital in Raipur.

Later, the infant was shifted to Rainbow Children's Hospital, Marathahalli - PICU and Pediatric Nephrology department **the hub hospital in Bengaluru** - The baby was **ventilated**, had number of **plasma exchanges and dialysis** and made full recovery in 20 days.

IN a critical medical case involving a six-month-old infant, the Rainbow Children's Hospital in Marathahalli, Bengaluru swift action and informed medical decision facilitated the urgent airlift of the baby from Raipur to Bengaluru to receive specialized medical services.

Under the guidance of Dr. Rakshay Shetty, Head of Paediatric Intensive Care Services, Marathahalli, the team that involved Dr. Deepak Ramesh, Consultant-Paediatric Intensive Care Unit at Rainbow Children's Hospital, Marathahalli, and Dr. Anupam Jaiswal, Consultant Paediatric Intensivist and Paediatrician, Bannerghatta Road gave the infant the necessary timely care and attention to stabilize her condition and ensure a smooth transition to the Rainbow Children's Hos-

pital in, Bengaluru. The infant started experiencing diarrhoea while the family was visiting Raipur from Canada. However, the situation became complicated as this diarrhoeal disease escalated to rapidly worsening kidney functions. Understanding the significance of time and the criticality of the entire situation, the expert team of doctors and staff at Rainbow Children's Hospital in Marathahalli quickly reThe infant was diagnosed with Haemolytic Uremic Syndrome (HUS), a severe medical condition characterised by high blood pressure and kidney failure



sponded to the parents' plea to air-lift the infant.

The infant was diagnosed with Haemolytic Uremic Syndrome (HUS), a severe medical condition characterized by high blood pressure and kidney failure. While initial medical support was provided at a local private hospital in Raipur, the critical progression of the case necessitated specialized medical interventions such as haemodialysis and plasma exchange therapy, especially in the case of infants. Recognizing the importance of time and the critical nature of the situation, the expert team of doctors and staff at Rainbow Children's Hospital in Marathahalli promptly responded to the parent's request to airlift the infant.

Speaking about the challenges involved in the case, Consultant-Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Rainbow Children's Hospital, Dr. Deepak Ramesh said, "Transporting an unstable infant with rapidly fluctuating blood pressure and compromised breathing due to excessive fluid in the body is difficult even by road transport. Air travel introduces changes in ambient pressures, which can profoundly affect the human body. In a critically ill child, this can lead to rapid deterioration. Additionally, a fixed-wing aircraft cannot be stopped midway and parked by the side for immediate assistance. It was challenging to safely transport the child in a

confined space, far from any

"Fortunately, the child only required monitoring during transport since the transport team of Dr. Anupam Jaiswal and Veeresh Tuttupad had stabilized the patient at the local hospital in Raipur before embarking on the flight. Prepared for any exigency that might arise, the medical professionals diligently continued the ongoing treatment without necessitating additional support during the flight," he added.

"We had to prepare and pack delicate equipment such as ventilators, ultrasound machines, monitors, etc., along with all the medications, ensuring their safe

ity to Raipur is limited, and the earliest available flight was at 7:30 am. So we had to prepare everything in advance on a Saturday night, ensure compatibility of all transportation on a commerequipment and connections

for use inside the aircraft,

and be prepared for an early morning take-off the next day. Once our team arrived in Raipur, they assessed the child's situation, requested and conducted essential investigations necessary for safe air transport. This ensured that the return jour-

ney was smooth without any complications"

Doctors explained that HUS is

a condition in which patients experience progressive kidney failure, along with symptoms such as blood-stained urine, body swelling due to fluid accumulation, high blood pressure, breathing difficulties, seizures, and a sudden drop in haemoglobin and platelet levels. When these symptoms occur together, they can lead to various complications and become life-threatening within a short period unless immediate medical attention is sought.







- 10 years old child presented with episode of left side seizures.
- The child was diagnosed with Ruptured Right Frontal Arteriovenous Malformation (conglomerate of arteries and veins in brain)
- Digital Subtraction Angiography (MRI) revealed compact nidus (hematoma/blood clot)
- After counselling, patient underwent surgical excision of the AVM.
- Patient recovered well in postoperative period with no neurological deficit
- Was monitored and managed for strict control of hypertension
- Discharged on Day 4 post surgery and patient doing well on followup







Child With Ruptured Brain Arterio-venous Malformation

Woman who had 9 abortions, becomes a Happy Mother



Patient 32 years visited us, a known case of PCOD, with a history of recurrent pregnancy loss. She had **9 previous abortions** in the first trimester due to a unique condition called anti phospholipid antibody syndrome (APLA).

This is an unusual condition in which there is a tendency to form blood clots in the blood vessels resulting in poor fetal growth and demise.


In the current pregnancy, she followed up with **Birthright by Rainbow.** By putting the patient on appropriate medications, personalized care, diet and management of bleeding during pregnancy, the pregnancy could be prolonged till 34 weeks. Delivered a healthy baby of 2.08 kgs.


Child with breathing issues recovered with cardiac surgery

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CT Angina




- Child was admitted multiple times at local hospitals and was referred since symptoms were not improving.
- We realized child was having an underlying cardiac conditions and underwent CT Angiogram which revealed pulmonary sling (compression of wind pipe behind distal trachea) resulting in breathing difficulty
- Cardiac surgeon at our cardiac hospital performed the re-implantation surgery to connect left pulmonary artery to main pulmonary artery with end to side anastomosis
- Child is doing well on follow up with no breathing issues (no stridor)











Fructose 1,6 bis phosphate deficiency



- 3 day old child was admitted with metabolic acidosis hypoglycaemia with high lactate levels.
- Diagnosed as Fructose 1,6 bis phosphate deficiency after extensive investigation.
- This is a very rare case and usually present when the baby starts on weaning food after six months when fruits are introduced to the baby.
- The family was counselled about the natural history of the condition. The baby is now doing well and on regular follow-up
