# Rabi Crops Get ₹22,303 cr Fert Subsidy

Cabinet okays nutrient-based fertiliser subsidy rates for rabi season 2023-24; below rates for kharif season

New Delhi: The Union cabinet approved nutrient-based fertiliser subsidy rates for rabi season 2023-24 with an outlay of ₹22,303 crore to ensure farmers continue to get sell nutrients at reasonable rates despite high global prices.

The subsidy for the upcoming rabi season will be applicable from October 1, 2023, till March 31, 2024, said agriculture minister Anupriya Patel during a press meeting on Wednesday.

For nitrogen-based fertiliser, the subsidy will be ₹47.2 per kg, for phosphorus it will be ₹20.82 per kg, for potash ₹2.38 per kg and for sulphur will be ₹1.89 per kg, he said.

For 8% Growth, Women Need to Bag Over 50% of New Jobs

New Delhi: Women need to account for over half the new jobs created by 2030 for India to achieve an 8% growth rate, a new Barclays study says. The estimated increase in female participation would have to rise six percentage points to 34.5% in 2023-33 for growth to jump from 6.6-5.5%, Barclays economists stated.

"Of the roughly 100 million estimated increase in labour force around 65 million (~50%) would have to come from women, which implies a massive increase in the share of males-to-females ratio—that is, for every female worker there would be 1.9 male workers in 2030, versus 2.2 currently," the report stated.

The report said besides increased female labour force participation, there was also a need to shift the focus away from agriculture to non-agriculture sectors. Nearly half the workforce is still employed in agriculture, despite the sector generating just 15% of output.

"A reallocation of workers from agriculture to non-agriculture sectors (industry/services) will be sustainable only if the recipient sectors can generate enough employment opportunities," the study said. "In agriculture, more women joining the labour force, as well as new entrants to the working age as the population itself grows," Barclays economists noted.

"Farmers will continue to get fertiliser at last year's rates," said Thakur.

The Centre was to spend ₹4,000 crore in 2023-24 on nutrient-based fertiliser subsidies according to the budget for this financial year. However, within the first five months of the financial year, the Centre spent ₹4,411 crore or 35% of the budget estimate. The total nutrient-based fertiliser subsidy this fiscal could touch ₹56,441 crore, 28% more than the budgeted amount, according to people aware of the matter.

These rates are, however, below that for phosphorus was ₹11 per kg. This is due to "rationalisation of subsidy on P&K fertilisers in view of recent trends in the international prices of fertilisers and inputs", se-
