- Pursuant to the Circular Nos. 14/2020, 17/2020, 20/2020, 02/2021, 19/2021, 21/2021, 02/2022 dated 8th April, 2020, 13th April, 2020, 5th May, 2020, 13th January, 2021, 8th December, 2021, 14th December, 2021, 5th May, 2022 followed by Circular Nos. 10/2022 and 11/2022 dated 28th December, 2022 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (hereinafter collectively referred to as "MCA Circulars") and the relaxations provided vide SEBI Circulars dated 12th May, 2020, 13th May, 2022 and 5th January, 2023 (hereinafter collectively referred to as "SEBI Circulars") physical attendance of the Members to the AGM venue is not required and Annual General Meeting (AGM) be held through Video Conferencing (VC) or Other Audio Visual Means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM through VC/ OAVM.
- 2 Since this AGM is being held through VC/ OAVM pursuant to the MCA Circulars, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with, accordingly, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM and hence the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not Annexed hereto. However, the Body Corporates are entitled to appoint authorised representatives to attend the AGM through VC/ OAVM and participate thereat and cast their votes through e-voting.
- The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available for 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
- 4 The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.

- 7 SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations2015 (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May

05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-Voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-Voting system as well as venue voting on the date of the AGM will be provided by NSDL.

- This AGM has been convened through VC/ OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the MCA Circular No., 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020, MCA Circular No. 2/2021 dated January 13, 2021, MCA Circular No. 19/2021 dated December 08, 2021, MCA Circular 21/2021 dated December 14, 2021, MCA Circular No. 02/2022 dated May 05, 2022 followed by MCA Circular Nos. 10/2022 and 11/2022 dated December 28, 2022.
- 9 The relevant details as required under Regulation 36(3) of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations"), of the person seeking re-appointment as Director under Item No. 2 the Notice, are also annexed as Annexure A hereto.
- 10 The Register of Members and Share Transfer books of the company will remain closed from Monday 25th September, 2023 to Saturday 30th September, 2023. (Both days inclusive).
- 11 Members desirous of obtaining any information concerning the accounts and operations of the company are requested to address their questions to the company so as to reach at least 7 days before the date of the meeting, so that the information required will be made available at the meeting, to the best extent possible.
- 12 All documents referred to in the notice requiring the approval of the members at the meeting and other statutory register shall be available for inspection by the Members at the registered office of the company during office hours on all working days between 11.00 am to 1.00 p.m. on all days except Saturdays, Sundays and public holiday, from the date hereof up to the date of the annual general meeting.
- 13 SEBI vide its latest Circular dated 16th March, 2023, in supersession of earlier Circulars in this regard, has reiterated that it is mandatory for all holders of physical securities to furnish their PAN as well as other KYC documents to the RTA (Registrar and Share Transfer Agent) of the Company in respect of all concerned Folios. The Folios wherein even any one of the PAN, Address with PIN Code, Email address, Mobile Number, Bank Account details, Specimen Signature and Nomination by holders of physical securities are not available on or after October 01, 2023, such Folios shall be frozen by the RTA. In terms of the aforesaid SEBI Circular, effective from 1st January 2022, any service requests or complaints received from the member, are not processed by RTA till the aforesaid details/ documents are provided to RTA. Members may also note that SEBI vide its Circular dated January 25, 2022 has mandated listed companies to issue securities in dematerialized form only while processing service requests viz. issue of duplicate securities certificates, claim from unclaimed suspense account, renewal/ exchange of securities certificate, endorsement, sub-division/ splitting of securities certificate, consolidation of securities certificates/ folios, transmission and transposition. In view of the same and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and avail various benefits of dematerialisation, Members are advised to dematerialise the shares held by them in physical form.

Accordingly, Members are requested to make service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR – 4. Further, SEBI vide its Circular dated 16th March, 2023 has mandated to furnish Form ISR-3 for opting out of Nomination by physical shareholders in case the shareholder do not wish to register for the Nomination.

The remote e-voting period begins on 27th September, 2023 at 09:00 A.M. and ends on 29th September, 2023 at 05:00 P.M. The remote e-voting module shall be disabled by NSDL for voting thereafter. The Members, whose names appear in the Register of Members / Beneficial Owners as on the record date (cut-off date) i.e. 24th September, 2023 may cast their vote electronically. The voting right of shareholders shall be in proportion to their share in the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date, being 24th September, 2023

How do I vote electronically using NSDL e-Voting system?

The way to vote electronically on NSDL e-Voting system consists of "Two Steps" which are mentioned below:

Step 1: Access to NSDL e-Voting system

A) Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meeting for Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode

In terms of SEBI circular dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT:

1) INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS:

GLOBAL DEVELOPMENTS AND THEIR EFFECT

Faster than anticipated recovery from the after-effects of economic spillovers marked the growth of the global economy in 2021-22. Fighting through several challenges like incremental inflation, cost-of-living, trade wars, and prolonged geopolitical conflict, the global economy ultimately started to regain its positive growth momentum. Effective economical stances undertaken by Governments across the world helped build the way for more resilience across nations and businesses, to stay future-prepared and on their toes. As per IMF World Economic Outlook, January 2023, the world economy grew by 3.4% in 2021-22 with an upgrade of 20 basis points from the previous forecast. Post Covid-19 pandemic, the sharp recovery in economic activities went subdued by the gradual yet firm grip of inflation that surcharged in the first half of 2021-22. As a cascading effect, the advanced and emerging economies also faced a slowed-down economic pace. For the advanced economy, according to IMF World Economic Outlook, January 2023, the estimated real GDP growth figures are 2.7% in 2021-22 and 1.2% in 2022-23 while for the emerging economies, the estimated figures are to stay at 3.9% for 2021-22 and 4.0% for 2022-23.

INDIAN ECONOMY

The Indian economy firmly established itself as the fastest growing entity among the major economies, amid global headwinds stifling the momentum of the global growth. The nation posted this significant growth that is majorly backed by private sector's spending, and intensified government efforts to improve the country's infrastructure. As per National Statistical Organisation (NSO), India's strong economic performance is expected to be 7% by the end of 2022-23. In the first quarter of 2022-23, prolonged inflationary pressure led the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) to recalibrate its monetary policies that is inclined towards tighter stance. In 2022-23, the RBI increased its reporate in six consecutive steps with latest increment of 25 basis points to 6.50% in February 2023. As a result, the Indian economy has already started to experience the easing of the inflationary grip while the inflation stood moderate during the third quarter. This positive transformation in the economy is aiding the demand scenario in the domestic market and enabling the country's economic wheel to roll in a geared momentum. The domestic market's demand situation is being aided by this encouraging change in the economy, which allows the nation's economic wheel to spin with increased momentum.

India's underlying economic fundamentals are strong, and despite the short-term turbulence, the impact on the long-term outlook is expected to remain marginal. Together, the growth-enhancing policies and schemes (such as Production-Linked Incentive and the Government's push towards self-reliance) and increased infrastructure spending are gradually leading to a stronger multiplier effect on jobs and income, higher productivity, and more efficiency, thereby, leading to accelerated economic growth. Furthermore, the emphasis on manufacturing in India, various Government incentives such as rising services exports on the back of stronger digitisation and technology transformation drive across the world are anticipated to aid the economy's growth. Moreover, several

spillover effects of geopolitical conflicts between Russia and Ukraine are likely to enhance India's status as a preferred alternate investment destination. A growing number of global inhouse centres and multinationals are preferring India over Eastern European markets (especially those that are on the borders of Ukraine) to shift their current operations or open new facilities.

SPECIALTY CHEMICALS MARKET OUTLOOK

With rising demand for value-added niche products like Dyes and pigments, Polymers, Surfactants, Textile chemicals, Water Chemicals, Personal care chemicals, the Specialty Chemicals sector (also called specialties or effect chemicals) is also contributing in reshaping the Indian economy. In rightfully doing so, it plays a pivotal role in the Indian Chemical Industry by contributing 7% of GDP and is expected to reach US\$ 304 billion by 2024-25, up from US\$ 178 billion in 2021-22. Not only is it the fastest-growing industry in India but also very well-renowned worldwide – for its quality, compliance, raw material availability, and skilled labour. The Indian specialty chemicals industry is also expected to outpace China, Japan and the rest of the world. From a trading perspective, specialty chemicals account for a significant share of more than 50% of chemical exports. Active pharmaceutical ingredients (APIs) and dyes & pigments continue to dominate the sub-segments in terms of influencing export potential. The factors that will make India an exporting hub are India's strong process engineering capabilities, low-cost manufacturing capabilities and abundant manpower are leading to an array of opportunities for imports and exports of specialty chemicals. Likewise, government initiatives, such as the Petroleum, chemicals and petrochemicals investment region (PCPIR) policy and production linked incentive (PLI) schemes, are providing reassurance to further develop the potential for domestic manufacturing and specialty chemicals, which are anticipated to benefit from this momentum.

The Company operates in a single segment of activity viz. trading and hence the segment reporting is not applicable to the Company.

4) Outlook

The outlook for the coming year 2023-24 looks promising for the Chemicals business at this point in time. Demand is showing signs of improvement and with a price advantage due to our best negotiation abilities we are likely to perform well. However, global recession and market condition may have an impact on our business to suffer which in turn can have bearing on profitability.

5) Risks and Concerns

Your Company had put a risk management framework in place post a comprehensive review of its risk management process. Your Company takes a fresh look at the risk management framework through our Audit Committee at least once in a year. The review involved understanding the existing risk management initiatives and assessment of risks in the businesses as the relative control measures and arriving at the desired counter measures keeping in mind the risk appetite of the organization. The audit Committee has periodically reviewed the risks in the business and recommended appropriate risk mitigating actions.

The business of the Company is likely to be affected by various internal and external risks enumerated as under:

- Our operations are significantly located in the Ahmedabad Region and failure to expand our operations may restrict our growth and adversely affect our business
- Our success depends largely upon the services of our Promoter, Directors and other key managerial personnel and our ability to attract and retain them.
- Company has credit risk on Trade Receivables and advanced unsecured loans to various parties. Company manages credit risk through continues monitoring of credit limits.
- The prices we are able to obtain for the products that we trade depend largely on prevailing market prices.
- We face intense competition in our businesses, which may limit our growth and prospects.
- Global economic, political and social conditions may harm our ability to do business, increase our costs and negatively affect our stock price.
- Global recession and market conditions could cause our business to suffer.

- Tax rates applicable to Our Company may increase and may have an adverse impact on our business.
- Political instability or changes in the Government could adversely affect economic conditions in India generally and our business in particular.

As a responsible employer, to ensure occupational safety and employment standards, your Company maintains strict safety and quality control programs to monitor and control these operational risks.

6) Internal Control System and their adequacy

The Company maintains adequate internal control systems, which provides, among other things, reasonable assurance of recording the transactions of its operations in all material respects and of providing protection against significant misuse or loss of company's assets.

Internal Controls are adequately supported by internal audit and periodical review of by the management. The audit committee meets periodically to review with the management and statutory auditors, financial statements. The Audit Committee also meets with the internal auditors to review adequacy /scope of internal audit function, significant findings and follow up thereon and finding of abnormal nature.

7) Discussion on financial performance with respect to operational performance.

During the financial year company has reported total revenue of Rs.403.22 lakhs as against the total revenue of Rs. 522.14 lakhs in the previous year. Net profit of the company during the current financial year stands at Rs. 11.80 lakhs as against profit of Rs. 48.05 lakhs in the previous year.

8) Material developments in human resources/ Industrial Relations front, including number of people employed.

Relations with the employees of the Company at various levels remained harmonial during the year under the review. The Company is making its best efforts to retain and attract talented employees. During the year under the review, the Company has complied with all legislative provisions of labour laws. The number of employees of the company as of 31st March, 2023 was 4.

- **b)** The Director should possess the highest personal and professional ethics, integrity and values

Wherever required the Director should disclose the nature of his interest, if there are reasons to believe there is or a likely hood of potential conflict of interest.

5. REMUNERATION CRITERIA:

Note: 1. Significant accounting policies

(a) Statement of compliance

The Standalone Financial Statements comply in all material respects with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and other relevant provisions of the Act, as amended.

(b) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on historical cost basis except for certain financial instruments measured at fair value. The Standalone Financial Statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis.

(c) Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions, that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of these financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses for the years presented. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed at each balance sheet date. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and future periods affected.

In particular, information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements are included in following notes:

- i) Recoverability/recognition of deferred tax assets and Estimation of Tax expenses and Liability
- ii) Assets and obligations relating to employee benefits
- iii) Impairment of Financial Assets such as Trade Receivables

(d) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when control of goods is transferred to a customer in accordance with the terms of the contract. The control of the goods is transferred upon delivery to the customers either at factory gate of the Company or specific location of the customer or when the goods are handed over to the freight carrier, as per the terms of the contract. A receivable is recognised by the Company when the goods are delivered to the customer as this represents the point in time at which the right to consideration becomes unconditional, as only the passage of time is required before payment is due.

Revenue is measured based on the consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled as per contract with a customer. The consideration is determined based on the price specified in the contract and revenue is only recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal will not occur. Contracts with customers are for short-term, at an agreed price basis having contracted credit period ranging up to 180 days. The contracts do not grant

any rights of return to the customer. Returns of goods are accepted by the Company only on an exception basis. Revenue excludes any taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government which are levied on sales such as goods and services tax.

Interest income from financial assets is recognised using the effective interest rate method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset. When calculating the effective interest rate, the Company estimates the expected cash flows by considering all the contractual terms of the financial instrument (for example, prepayment, extension, call and similar options) but does not consider the expected credit losses.

(e) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated.

Provisions are measured at the present value of best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash and the discount rate used to determine present value is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

(f) Income taxes:

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred taxes. Income tax expense is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss except when they relate to items that are recognized outside profit or loss (whether in other comprehensive income or directly in equity), in which case tax is also recognized outside profit or loss. Current income taxes are determined based on respective taxable income of each taxable entity. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized for the future tax consequences of temporary differences between the carrying values of assets and liabilities and their respective tax bases, and unutilized business loss and depreciation carry-forwards and tax credits. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are computed separately for each taxable entity. Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that future taxable income will be available computed separately for each taxable entity. Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that future taxable income will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses, depreciation carry-forwards and unused tax credits could be utilized. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured based on the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the Company intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis.

(g) Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share has been computed by dividing profit/loss for the year by the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year.

Diluted earnings per share has been computed using the weighted average number of shares and dilutive potential shares, except where the result would be anti-dilutive.

(h) Segments

Company is engaged in only one segment, Trading Business.

(i) Financial instruments

i) Classification, initial recognition and measurement

Financial instruments are recognized on the balance sheet when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument Initially, a financial instrument is recognized at its transaction price as per appendix D20 of Ind AS 101 first time adoption.

Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial instruments are recognized in determining the carrying amount, if it is not classified as at fair value through profit or loss. Subsequently, Financial instruments are measured according to the category in which they are classified.

Financial assets at amortised cost: Financial assets having contractual terms that give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding and that are held within a business model whose objective is to hold such assets in order to collect such contractual cash flows are classified in this category. Subsequently, these are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method less any impairment losses.

Equity instruments: An equity instrument is any contract that evidences residual interests in the assets of the Company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Other financial liabilities: These are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

(j) Inventories

Cost of Traded goods is valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost of traded goods include cost of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventory to the present location and condition, however there is no inventory at the end of the year.

(k) Property Plant and Equipment

Property Plant and Equipment are measured at cost/deemed Cost, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. Subsequent costs are included in the carrying amount of asset or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance expenses are charged to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which they are incurred. Gains or losses arising on retirement or disposal of assets are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

(I) Depreciation methods, estimated useful lives and residual value:

The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of expected useful life and the expected residual value of the assets at the end of its useful life. The lives are based on historical experience with similar assets as well as anticipation of future events, which may impact their life.

Depreciation is provided on a pro-rata basis on the straight-line method from the date of acquisition, installation till the date the assets are sold or disposed of.

The useful life of the Plant and Machinery is 7 to 25 Years

(m) Impairment of assets:

The carrying amount of assets are reviewed at each Standalone Balance Sheet date to assess if there is any indication of impairment based on internal | external factors. An impairment loss on such assessment is recognised wherever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount of the assets is net selling price or value in use, whichever is higher. While assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to the present value by using weighted average cost of capital. A previously recognised impairment loss is further provided or reversed depending on changes in the circumstances and to the extent that carrying amount of the assets does not exceed the carrying amount that will be determined if no impairment loss had previously been recognised

n) Cash and cash equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, demand deposits with bank and other short-term (three months or less from the date of acquisition), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

o) Trade receivables:

Trade receivables are recognised when the right to consideration becomes unconditional. These assets are held at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate (EIR) method where applicable, less provision for impairment based on expected credit loss.

p) Trade and other payables:

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months from the reporting date. They are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method.

(q) Contingent Liabilities and contingent Assets

- (a) Contingent Liabilities are disclosed in either of the following cases: i) A present obligation arising from a past event when it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; or ii) A reliable estimate of the present obligation cannot be made; or iii) A possible obligation unless the probability of outflow of resource is remote.
- (b) Contingent assets is disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.
- (c) Contingent Liability and Provisions needed against Contingent Liability and Contingent Assets are reviewed at each Reporting date.
- (d) Contingent Liability is net of estimated provisions considering possible outflow on settlement.

Note 24: Fair value Measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- a) In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- b) In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- a) Level 1 -- This includes financial instruments measured using quoted prices. The fair value of all equity instruments which are traded on the Stock Exchanges is valued using the closing price as at the reporting period.
- b) Level 2 -- The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market (for example over-the-counter derivatives) is
- determined using valuation techniques which maximise the use of observable market data and rely as little as possible on entity-specific estimates.
- c) Level 3 -- If one or more of the significant inputs is not based on observable market data, the instrument is included in level 3

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

External valuers are involved, wherever required, for valuation of significant assets, such as properties, unquoted financial assets and significant liabilities. Involvement of external valuers is decided upon by the Company after discussion with and approval by the Company's management. Selection criteria include market knowledge, reputation, independence and whether professional standards are maintained. The Company, after discussions with its external valuers, determines which valuation techniques and inputs to use for each case.

At each reporting date, the Company analyses the movements in the values of assets and liabilities which are required to be remeasured or reassessed as per the Company's accounting policies. For this analysis, the Company verifies the major inputs applied in the latest valuation by agreeing the information in the valuation computation to contracts and other relevant documents. The Company also compares the change in the fair value of each asset and liability with relevant external sources to determine whether the change is reasonable.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

This note summarises accounting policy for fair value measurement. Other fair value related disclosures are given in the relevant notes.

Note 25: Financial risk management

The Company's principal financial liabilities comprise of loans and borrowings, trade payables and other financial liabilities. The loans and borrowings are primarily taken to finance and support the Company's operations. The Company's principal financial assets include investments, loans, cash and cash equivalents, trade receivables and other financial assets.

The Company is exposed to market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Company's senior management oversees the management of these risks. The Company's senior management ensures that financial risk activities are governed by appropriate policies and procedures and that financial risks are identified, measured and managed in accordance with the Company's policies and risk objectives. The risk management system is relevant to business reality, pragmatic and simple and involves the following:

Risk identification and definition: Focuses on identifying relevant risks, creating / updating clear definitions to ensureundisputed understanding along with details of the underlying root causes / contributing factors.

Risk classification: Focuses on understanding the various impacts of risks and the level of influence on its root causes. This involves identifying various processes generating the root causes and clear understanding of risk interrelationships.

Risk assessment and prioritisation: Focuses on determining risk priority and risk ownership for critical risks. This involves assessment of the various impacts taking into consideration risk appetite and existing mitigation controls.

Risk mitigation: Focuses on addressing critical risks to restrict their impact(s) to an acceptable level (within the defined risk appetite). This involves a clear definition of actions, responsibilities and milestones.

Risk reporting and monitoring: Focuses on providing to the Board periodic information on risk profile evolution and mitigation plans.

1. Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: interest rate risk, currency risk and other price risk, such as equity price risk or Net assset value ("NAV") risk in case of investment in mutual funds. Financial instruments affected by market risk include investments, trade receivables, trade payables, loans and borrowings and deposits.

The sensitivity analysis in the following sections relate to the position as at March 31, 2022 and March 31, 2021.

The sensitivity of the relevant profit and loss item is the effect of the assumed changes in respective market risks. This is based on the financial assets and financial liabilities held at March 31, 2022 and March 31, 2021.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Company do not have any Borrowings and hence do not have any Interest Rate Risk

Foreign currency risk

The Company do not have any international operations and is not exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from foreign currency transactions. Foreign exchange risk arises from future commercial transactions and recognised financial assets and liabilities denominated in a currency that is not its functional currency (Rs). The risk also includes highly probable foreign currency cash flows

2 Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that counterparty will not meet its obligations under a financial instrument or customer contract, leading to a financial loss. The Company is exposed to credit risk from its operating activities (primarily trade receivables) and from its financing activities, including deposits with banks and financial institutions and foreign exchange transactions.

Trade receivables

Customer credit risk is managed by the Company's internal policies, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. Credit quality of a customer is assessed based on an credit rating scorecard and credit limits are defined in accordance with this assessment. Outstanding customer receivables are regularly monitored and any shipments to major customers are generally covered by letters of credit. As at March 31, 2022, there were 1 customer with balances greater than Rs.100 lakhs accounting for 41.13% of the total amounts receivables. As at March 31, 2021 there were 1 with balances greater than Rs.100 lakhs accounting for 56.15% of the total amounts receivables.

Trade receivables are non-interest bearing and are generally on period ranging upto 180 days credit terms. Credit limits are established for all customers based on internal rating criteria.

3 <u>Liquidity Risk</u>

The principal sources of liquidity of the Company are cash and cash equivalents, borrowings and the cash flow that is generated from operations. It believes that current cash and cash equivalents, tied up borrowing lines and cash flow that is generated from operations is sufficient to meet requirements. Accordingly, liquidity risk is perceived to be low.
