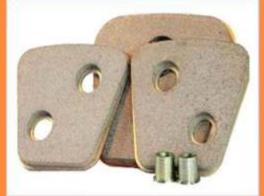

- The Statement pursuant to the provisions of Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act") in respect of special business is annexed hereto and forms part of this notice. The Board of Directors of the Company have considered and decided to include Item Nos. 4 to 8 given above as Special Business in the forthcoming Annual General Meeting ("AGM"), as they are unavoidable in nature.
- 2. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") has vide its General Circular No. 10/2022 dated 28th December, 2022 read with Circular No. 14/2020 dated 8th April, 2020, Circular No. 17/2020 dated 13th April, 2020, Circular No. 20/2020 dated 5th May, 2020 and Circular No. 02/2022 dated 5th May, 2022 (collectively referred to as "MCA Circulars"), have permitted holding of general meetings through Video Conferencing ("VC") / Other Audio-Visual Means ("OAVM"), without physical presence of the Members at a common venue. In compliance with applicable provisions of the Act and MCA circulars, the 59th AGM of the Company will be conducted through VC / OAVM without physical presence of the members at a common venue. The Company has engaged services of Central Depository Services (India) Limited ("CDSL") for conducting of the AGM and facilitating voting through electronic means i.e. remote e-voting and voting during the AGM.
- 3. Further, the Securities and Exchange Board of India("SEBI") vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/4 dated 5th January, 2023 read with circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/P/2020/79 dated 12th May, 2020 ("SEBI Circulars"), has given relaxation from sending hard copy of Annual Report containing salient features of all the documents prescribed in Section 136 of the Act and proxy form as required under Regulation 44(4) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations") to the members who have not registered their email addresses in case of general meetings are held through VC/OAVM.
- 4. In accordance with the Secretarial Standard -2 on General Meetings issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India ("ICSI") read with Guidance/Clarification dated 15th April, 2020 issued by the ICSI, the proceedings of the 59th AGM shall be deemed to be conducted at the Registered Office of the Company situated at Peninsula Business Park, 'A' Tower, 8th Floor, Senapati Bapat Marg, Lower Parel, Mumbai 400013. The Members are requested to attend the 59th AGM from their respective locations through VC / OAVM and do not visit the Registered Office to attend the AGM.
- 5. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, a member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a member of the Company. However, since this 59th AGM is being conducted, pursuant to the said MCA and SEBI Circulars, through VC / OAVM, physical attendance of members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the members will not be available for this 59th AGM and hence the Proxy Form, Attendance Slip and Route Map are not annexed to this Notice.
- In pursuance of Sections 112 and 113 of the Act, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the 59th AGM through VC/OAVM and cast their vote through e-voting.

- 7. Institutional/Corporate members intending to represent through their authorised representatives in the AGM through VC/OAVM and to vote through remote e-voting or vote at the AGM are requested to send to the Company certified copy of the Board Resolution passed pursuant to the provisions of Section 113 of the Act authorising their representative to the Company at its registered office by post/hand delivery or through email at designated e-mail address of the Company i.e. investor@hindcompo.com or at the Scrutinizer's email address i.e. manish@csmanishb.in.
- 8. In case of joint holders attending the meeting, only such joint holder who is higher in order of names will be entitled to vote.
- 9. The Register of Directors and Key Managerial Personnel and their shareholding, maintained under Section 170 of the Act, and the Register of Contracts or Arrangements in which the directors are interested, maintained under Section 189 of the Act and all documents referred to in the notice of 59th AGM, will be available for inspection by the Members on request by sending an e-mail to investor@hindcompo.com.
- 10. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 91 of the Act and Regulation 42 of the Listing Regulations, the Register of Members and the Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Saturday, 23rd September, 2023 to Friday, 29th September, 2023 (both days inclusive).
- 11. The dividend on Equity shares as recommended by the Board of Directors for the financial year ended 31st March, 2023, if approved by the members at the ensuing 59th AGM, will be paid to those members whose names stand registered in the Register of Members as on Friday, 22nd September, 2023 and in respect of the shares held in dematerialized form, the dividend will be paid to members whose names are furnished by National Securities Depository Limited / Central Depository Services (India) Limited as beneficial owners as on that date. In case the Company is unable to pay the dividend to any member by the electronic mode due to non-availability of the details of the bank account, the Company shall dispatch the dividend warrant/demand draft by post.
- 12. Members may note that the Income Tax Act, 1961 ("IT Act"), as amended by the Finance Act, 2020, mandates that the dividend paid or distributed by a company after 1st April, 2020 shall be taxable in the hands of members. The Company shall therefore be required to deduct tax at source ("TDS") at the time of making the payment of final dividend. In order to enable us to determine the appropriate TDS rate as applicable, the members are requested to submit Form 15G/Form 15H or any other documents as applicable, if any, in accordance with the provisions of the ITAct.

For resident shareholders taxes shall be deducted at source under Section 194 of the ITAct as follows:

Members having valid PAN	10% or as notified by the
	Government of India
Members not having PAN / Invalid PAN	20% or as notified by the Government of India

However, no tax shall be deducted on the dividend payable to a resident individual if the total dividend to be received by him during Financial Year 2023-24 does not exceed ₹ 5,000 and also in cases where members have provided Form 15G / Form 15H (applicable to individuals aged 60 years or

more), subject to conditions specified in the IT Act. Resident shareholders may also submit any other document as prescribed under the IT Act to claim a lower/Nil withholding tax. Registered members may also submit any other document as prescribed under the IT Act to claim a lower/Nil withholding tax. PAN is mandatory for members providing Form 15G/15H or any other document as applicable, if any, in accordance with the provisions of the IT Act.

For non-resident shareholders, taxes are required to be withheld in accordance with the provisions of Section 195 and other applicable sections of the IT Act, at the rates in force. The withholding tax shall be at the rate of 20% (plus applicable surcharge and cess) or as notified by the Government of India on the amount of dividend payable. However, as per Section 90 of the IT Act, non-resident shareholders have the option to be governed by the provisions of the Double Tax Avoidance Agreement (DTAA) read with Multilateral Instrument ("MLI") between India and the country of tax residence of the member, if they are more beneficial to them. For this purpose, i.e. to avail the benefits under the DTAA read with MLI, nonresident shareholders will have to provide the following:

- Copy of the PAN card allotted by the Indian Income Tax authorities duly attested by the member or details as prescribed under rule 37BC of Income-tax Rules, 1962
- Copy of Tax Residency Certificate (TRC) for the FY 2023-24 obtained from the revenue authorities of the country of tax residence, duly attested by member
- Self-declaration in Form 10F
- Self-declaration by the shareholder of having no permanent establishment in India in accordance with the applicable tax treaty
- Self-declaration of beneficial ownership by the nonresident shareholder
- Any other documents as prescribed under the IT Act for lower withholding of taxes if applicable, duly attested by member

In case of Foreign Institutional Investors / Foreign Portfolio Investors, tax will be deducted under Section 196D of the IT Act @ 20% (plus applicable surcharge and cess) or the rate provided in relevant DTAA, read with MLI, whichever is more beneficial, subject to the submission of the above documents.

The aforementioned documents are required to be submitted by sending email at investor@hindcompo.com upto 23.59 hrs. IST on 22nd September, 2023.

13. As per Regulation 40 of the Listing Regulations, as amended, the request for transfer of securities shall not be processed unless the securities are held in the dematerialised form with the depositories. Further the request for transmission or transposition of securities held in physical or dematerialised form shall be affected only in dematerialised form. Hence members who hold shares in physical form are requested to dematerialize their shares, so they can transfer their shares in future, if so desire. However, members can continue to hold shares in physical form.

- 14. The Schedule I of the Listing Regulations mandates to all listed companies to use the Reserve Bank of India's approved electronic mode of payment such as National Automated Clearing House ("NACH"), National Electronic Fund Transfer (NEFT), Real Time Gross Settlement (RTGS) for making payments like dividend to the shareholders. Accordingly, members who have not updated their bank account details and wish to avail such facility in future are requested to update their bank account details by submitting Form ISR-1 and ISR-2, available on Company's website viz. www.hindcompo.com, with the Registrar and Share Transfer Agent ("RTA") of the Company.
- 15. The cut-off date for the purpose of determining eligibility of members for voting in connection with the 59th AGM and payment of final dividend for the financial year 2022-23 has been fixed as Friday, 22nd September, 2023 ("Cut-off date").
- 16. Members holding shares in physical form are requested to notify immediately any change in their address or bank details to the Company / RTA quoting their Folio Number. Members holding shares in the demat form are requested to update such details with their respective Depository Participants.
- 17. The Company has transferred the unpaid or unclaimed dividend declared upto financial years 2014-15, from time to time, to the Investor Education and Protection Fund ("IEPF") established by the Central Government. The unclaimed dividend in respect of the financial year ended 31st March, 2016 is due for transfer to the IEPF Authority in month of October, 2023. The shareholders whose dividend remained unclaimed for the financial year 2015-16 and for subsequent financial years are requested to claim it immediately from the Company. The Company has uploaded the details of unpaid and unclaimed dividend amounts lying with the Company as on 31st March, 2023 under "Investor Relations" section on the website of the Company viz. www.hindcompo.com. The details of unpaid and unclaimed dividend amounts lying with the Company can also be accessed on the website of Ministry of Corporate Affairs viz. www.mca.gov.in and on the website of IEPF viz. www.iepf.gov.in. Attention of the members is drawn to the provisions of Section 124(6) of the Act, which requires a company to transfer in the name of the IEPF Authority all shares in respect of which dividend has not been paid or claimed for 7 (seven) consecutive years or more.

In accordance with the aforesaid provisions of Section 124(6) of the Act read with the Investor Education and Protection Fund Authority (Accounting, Audit, Transfer and Refund) Rules, 2016, as amended, the Company has transferred 15,718 equity shares in respect of which dividend declared for the financial year 2014-2015 or earlier financial years remained unpaid or unclaimed by the members for 7 (seven) consecutive years or more to the Investor Education and Protection fund via corporate actions through Depositories.

A member desirous to claim back his shares from the IEPF Authority can do so by following prescribed procedure under the said Rules. The aforesaid details are available on the website of the Company viz. www.hindcompo.com and have also been uploaded on the website of the Ministry of Corporate Affairs and the same can be accessed through the link: www.mca.gov.in and on the website of IEPF viz. www.iepf.gov.in.



Further, the Company has initiated necessary action for transfer of all shares in respect of which dividend declared for the financial year 2015-16 and thereafter has remained unpaid or unclaimed by the members for 7 (seven) consecutive years or more.

- 18. Members can join the 59th AGM through VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the 59th AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to atleast 1000 members on first come first serve basis; however this limit does not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders' Relationship Committee, Auditors etc., who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first serve basis.
- 19. The attendance of the Members attending the 59th AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
- 20. The SEBI has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number ('PAN') by every participant in securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are, therefore, requested to submit their PAN details to their respective Depository Participants with whom they are maintaining their demat accounts. Members holding shares in physical form can submit their PAN to the Company / RTA.
- 21. To comply with the provisions of Section 88 of the Act, read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rule 2014, the Company is required to update its database by incorporating some additional details of its members.

Members are requested to submit their e-mail ID and other details vide e-mail updation form available on Company's website viz. www.hindcompo.com. The same could be done by filling up and signing at the appropriate place in the said form and by sending the same to the RTA.

The e-mail ID provided shall be updated, subject to successful verification of your signatures as per record available with the RTA of the Company.

- 22. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA and SEBI Circulars, Notice of the 59th AGM along with the Annual Report 2022-23 is being sent only through electronic mode to those members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/ Depository Participants. Members may note that the Notice and Annual Report 2022-23 will also be available on the Company's website viz. www.hindcompo.com, websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited and National Stock Exchange of India Limited viz. www.bseindia.com and www.nseindia.com respectively and on the website of CDSL viz. www.evotingindia.com.
- 23. Non-Resident Indian members are requested to inform to the Company's Registrar & Share Transfer Agents, immediately of any change in their residential status on return to India for permanent settlement, their bank account maintained in India with complete name, branch, account type, account number and address of the bank with pin code, if the details are not furnished earlier.

- 24. Members holding shares in identical order of names in more than one folio are requested to write to the Company / RTA enclosing their Share Certificates to enable the Company to consolidate their holdings in one folio for better services.
- 25. Members are requested to forward their all communications to the RTA of the Company and are further requested to always quote their Folio Number / DPID-Client ID in all correspondence with the Company.
- 26. Members holding shares in single name and physical form are advised to make nomination in respect of their shareholding in the Company.
- 27. Brief resume of directors proposed to be appointed / reappointed and whose remuneration is being approved at the ensuing 59th AGM in terms of Regulation 36(3) of the Listing Regulations and SS-2 Secretarial Standard on "General Meetings" is annexed to the Notice.
- 28. The shares of the Company are listed on BSE Limited and National Stock Exchange of India Limited. Listing fees for the financial year 2023-24 have been paid to both the stock exchanges.
- 29. Members may also note that 59th Annual Report for the year 2022-23 is also available on the website of the Company at www.hindcompo.com.
- 30. To support the Green Initiative, members who have not registered their email addresses are requested to register the same with the Company's RTA/ their Depository Participants, in respect of shares held in physical/ electronic mode, respectively.
- 31. The SEBI vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD-POD-1/P/CIR/2023/37 dated 16th March, 2023 has made it mandatory for all holders of physical securities in listed companies to furnish PAN, Nomination, Contact details, Bank account details and Specimen signature for their corresponding folio numbers. All holders of shares in physical form are requested to furnish / update the PAN, Nomination, Contact details, Bank account details and specimen signature to the RTA in Form ISR-1 and ISR-2 as per the above referred circular. The respective Forms are available on the website of the Company and RTA.

The SEBI has further clarified that physical folios wherein the PAN, KYC and Nomination details are not available on or after 1st October, 2023, shall be frozen by the RTA and will be eligible for lodging any service request or receiving payment of dividend only after registering the required details. The said physical folios shall be referred by the Company or RTA to the administering authority under the Benami Transactions (Prohibitions) Act, 1988 and/or Prevention of Money Laundering Act, 2002, if they continue to remain frozen as on 31st December, 2025. Members are advised to register their said details with the RTA in compliance with the said Circular for smooth processing of their service request(s).

The forms for updation of PAN, KYC, Bank details and Nomination viz., Forms ISR-1, ISR-2, ISR-3, SH-13 and the said SEBI Circular are available on our website at www.hindcompo.com. In accordance with the aforesaid circular, the Company had sent communication to those members holding shares in physical mode, whose folios are

incomplete with respect to PAN, KYC and / or Nomination details requesting them to update the details so as to avoid freezing of the folios. Members who hold shares in dematerialised form and wish to update their PAN, KYC, Bank and Nomination details are requested to contact their respective DPs.

As per the provisions of Section 72 of the Act and aforesaid SEBI Circular, the facility for making nomination is available for the members in respect of the shares held by them. Members who have not yet registered their nomination are requested to register the same by submitting Form No. SH-13. If a member desires to opt out or cancel the earlier nomination and record a fresh nomination, he / she may submit the same in Form ISR-3 or Form SH-14, as the case may be. The said forms can be downloaded from the Company's website. Members are requested to submit these details to their DP, in case the shares are held by them in electronic form, and to the RTA, in case the shares are held in physical form.

- 32. The SEBI vide Gazette Notification no. SEBI/LADNRO/ GN/2022/66 dated 24th January, 2022 read with SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD RTAMB/P/ CIR/2022/8 dated 25th January, 2022 has made mandatory for listed companies to issue securities in dematerialized form only. The SEBI vide its circular No. SEBI/HO/ MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/ P/CIR/2022/65 dated 18th May 2022 has simplified the procedure and standardized the format of documents for transmission of securities; henceforth while processing certain prescribed service request(s) such as issue of duplicate share certificate, claim from Unclaimed Suspense Account, renewal/exchange of share certificate, endorsement, sub-division/splitting of share certificate, consolidation of share certificate(s)/ folio(s), transmission, and/or transposition received from the shareholder/claimant. Upon receipt of service request(s) from shareholder/claimant (in prescribed form ISR-4), the RTA of the Company shall verify and process the said request. After removing objections, if any, intimate the shareholder/claimant about its execution/issuance of new certificate as may be applicable. The RTA shall retain the physical Share Certificate with them and shall issue 'Letter of Confirmation' to the shareholder/claimant in lieu of physical share certificate(s). The shareholder/claimant shall lodge request for dematerialization of shares along with the original Letter of Confirmation received from the RTA within 120 days (One Hundred and Twenty days) of issue of the Letter of Confirmation to his Depository Participant (DP). In case the shareholder/claimant fails to submit the demat request within the aforesaid period, the Company shall credit shares to the Suspense Escrow Demat Account of the Company opened for the said purpose.
- 33. SEBI vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/P/CIR/2022/76 dated 30th May, 2022 provided an option for arbitration as a Dispute Resolution Mechanism for investors. As per this Circular, investors can opt for arbitration with the Stock Exchanges in case of any dispute against the Company or its RTA on delay or default in processing any investor service related requests. In compliance with the said Circular, the Company had sent communication intimating about the Dispute Resolution Mechanism to all the members holding shares in physical form.

- 34. In compliance with provisions of Section 108 of the Act, read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, Regulation 44 of the Listing Regulations and Secretarial Standards on General Meetings (SS-2) issued by the ICSI, the Company is pleased to provide e-voting facility to its members to exercise their right to vote electronically on the resolutions mentioned in the notice of 59th AGM dated 30th June, 2023. The members may cast their vote using electronic voting system from a place other than the venue of the meeting ("remote e-voting").
 - (a) The facility of casting the vote by the members/ shareholders using an electronic voting system from a place other than venue of the AGM ("remote e-voting") and e-voting during the meeting will be provided by the Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL evoting System).
 - (b) A person, whose name is recorded in the Register of Members or in the List Beneficial Owners maintained by the Depositories as on the cut-off date only shall be entitled to avail the facility of "remote evoting" or e-voting during the AGM.
 - (c) The "remote e-voting" period commences on Tuesday, 26th September, 2023 (9:00 hrs.) and ends on Thursday, 28th September, 2023 (17:00 hrs.). During this period, members / shareholders of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date, may cast their vote by "remote e-voting". The "remote e-voting" module shall be disabled by the CDSL for voting thereafter. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by a member, the member shall not be allowed to change it subsequently.
 - (d) The voting rights of members / shareholders shall be in proportion to their share of the paid up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date.
 - Any person who becomes a member of the Company after dispatch of the Notice of the meeting and holding shares as on the cut-off date may obtain the User ID and password by sending a request at helpdesk@linkintime.co.in. However, if the member is already registered with CDSL for remote e-voting then he can use his exiting user ID and password for casting the vote through e-voting.  - (e) The Board of Directors of the Company has appointed CS Manish Baldeva, Proprietor of M/s. M Baldeva Associates, Company Secretaries, Thane (FCS No.: 6180/CP No.: 11062) as Scrutinizer to scrutinize the voting through remote e-voting process and e-voting during the 59th AGM in a fair and transparent manner. The Scrutinizer shall, within 2 working days from the conclusion of the AGM, prepare a consolidated scrutinizers' report of the votes cast in favour or against, if any, and forthwith the same to the Chairman of the meeting or a person authorized by him who shall countersign the same and declare the result of the voting.



- (f) The result declared along with the report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company viz, www.hindcompo.com and on the website of CDSL viz. www.evotingindia.com immediately after the declaration of result by the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing. The results shall simultaneously be communicated to the stock exchanges.
- (g) Subject to receipt of requisite number of votes in favour, the resolutions shall be deemed to be passed on the date of the Meeting i.e. Friday, 29th September, 2023.

THE PROCEDURE / INSTRUCTIONS TO SHAREHOLDERS FOR REMOTE E-VOTING AND E-VOTING DURING 59th AGM AND JOINING MEETING THROUGH VC / OAVM ARE AS UNDER:

- (i) The voting period begins on Tuesday, 26th September, 2023 (9:00 hrs.) and ends on Thursday, 28th September, 2023 (17:00 hrs.). During this period shareholders of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by the CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/ 2020/242 dated 9th December, 2020, under Regulation 44 of the Listing Regulations, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public noninstitutional shareholders / retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, e-voting has been enabled to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories / Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

(iii) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/ 2020/242 dated 9th December, 2020 on e-voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Your Directors are pleased to present the Fifty Ninth Annual Report together with the Standalone and Consolidated Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the financial year ended 31st March, 2023.

1. FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Company's financial performance for the financial year ended 31st March, 2023 is summarized below:

2. OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

On a standalone basis, the Company achieved total revenue of ₹ 28,268.76 Lakhs during the financial year under review compared to ₹ 23,263.96 Lakhs in the previous financial year. The net manufacturing revenue was higher by 26.79 % from ₹ 18,592.29 Lakhs to ₹ 23,469.93 Lakhs.

Investment income during the financial year was also higher at ₹ 4,731.54 Lakhs compared to ₹ 4,671.67 Lakhs in the previous financial year. It was achieved with judicious deployment of funds in various asset classes, despite volatile market conditions and falling interest rates.

The gross profit of the Company was higher at ₹ 4,145.25 Lakhs as against ₹ 3,335.59 Lakhs in the previous financial year. After considering the interest of ₹ 12.67 Lakhs and depreciation of ₹ 872.93 Lakhs, Profit before tax was ₹ 3,259.65 Lakhs. With a tax provision of ₹ 512.38 Lakhs (previous year ₹ 311.27 Lakhs) profit after tax stood at ₹ 2,747.27 Lakhs as against ₹ 2,160.16 Lakhs in the previous financial year. Other comprehensive income, net of tax during the financial year was ₹ - 2,093.46 Lakhs (previous financial year ₹ 8,161.68 Lakhs) and the total comprehensive income was ₹ 653.81 Lakhs (previous financial year ₹ 10,321.84 Lakhs).

During the financial year, the Company continued its growth trajectory and posted excellent results with highest ever revenue and improved profitability. It aligned with the overall

success of the auto industry. Growth was led by strong traction in commercial vehicle / rail friction material business.

The financial year 2022-23 was marked by global events causing significant disruption to the world economy including the Russia-Ukraine conflict, China's lockdowns and European market slowdown. These led to supply chain disruption and volatile input prices making cost planning challenging. India showcased resilience with a remarkable 6.8% growth rate, becoming fastest growing economy. The government policy aims to drive economic growth and infrastructure development. The Indian automotive industry emerged as a leading global player and performed very well.

Amid the dynamic landscape of the automotive sector, our Company has adeptly positioned itself for healthy growth. Our Company is deeply aware of customer expectations and has taken proactive measures to align itself towards the development of high performance products. The Company continues to emphasis on improvement in operational efficiencies, higher productivity, and prudent cost control measures.

The investment segment faced some challenges related to fluctuations in interest rates, volatile stock market, currency depreciation and global uncertainties. However, performance of investment operations remains stable with a conservative approach towards deployment of funds, keeping capital protection in focus.



The working of Company's Joint venture viz. Compo Advics Private Limited, though improved, remained under pressure with high raw material cost escalation and low-price realization. Several measures have been taken towards change in product mix and cost reduction program.

The outlook for the financial year 2023-24 remain positive with continued growth prospectus of automotive industry in terms of underlying demand. With a clear focus on innovation and customer satisfaction, the Company is well positioned to achieve its plan and will remain a major player in its business segment. The Company also foresees a significant demand growth from its rail business.

There was no change in the nature of the business of the Company during the financial year under review.

3. MATERIAL CHANGES AND COMMITMENTS AFFECTING FINANCIAL POSITION BETWEEN THE END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR AND DATE OF THE REPORT

There were no material changes and commitments affecting the financial position of the Company between the end of the financial year to which the financial statements relate and the date of this annual report.

4. SHARE CAPITAL OF THE COMPANY

During the financial year under review, there was no change in the share capital of the Company. The paid-up equity share capital of your Company as on 31st March, 2023 was ₹.7,38,45,000/- (Rupees Seven Crore Thirty Eight Lakh Forty Five Thousand only) divided into 1,47,69,000 Equity Shares of ₹5/- (Rupees Five only) each fully paid up.

During the financial year under review, the Company has not issued shares with differential voting rights nor granted stock options nor sweat equity.

5. DIVIDEND & DIVIDEND POLICY

Your directors have recommended a dividend of ₹ 2/- per share (previous financial year ₹ 2/- per share) of ₹ 5/- each, being 40% (previous financial year 40%) on equity share capital for the financial year ended 31^{st} March, 2023. This will absorb a total cash outflow of ₹ 295.38 Lakhs. The dividend, if approved, will be paid to those members whose names shall appear in the Register of Members / List of Beneficiaries as on Friday, 22^{nd} September, 2023.

Your Company has a Joint Venture Company namely "Compo Advics (India) Private Limited." The Company had no subsidiary or associate company during the financial year under review.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 129(3) of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act'), a statement containing salient features of financial statements of the Joint Venture Company in Form AOC-1 is attached to the financial statements of the Company forming part of this Annual Report.

No subsidiary, joint venture or associate company were formed or ceased during the financial year under review.

8. CONSOLIDATED AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Pursuant to the provisions of Sections 129 and 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and as required under Regulation 34 of the Listing Regulations, the Company has prepared Consolidated Audited Financial Statements consolidating financial statements of its Joint Venture Company namely "Compo Advics (India) Private Limited" with its financial statements in accordance with the applicable provisions of Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind-AS").

9. RISK MANAGEMENT AND AREAS OF CONCERN

A detailed exercise is being carried out from time to time to identify, evaluate, manage and monitoring of both business and non-business risks. The Board periodically reviews the risks and suggests steps to be taken to control and mitigate the same through a properly defined framework.

During the financial year 2022-23, the Risk Management Committee was reconstituted. Mr. Raghu Mody ceased to be member of the Risk Management Committee with effect from close of business hours of 11th November, 2022 and Mr. P. K. Choudhary was designated as Chairman of the Risk Management Committee with effect from 12th November, 2022. Pursuant to the provisions of Regulation 21 of the Listing Regulations, as on 31st March, 2023, Risk Management Committee comprised of Mr. Lalit Kumar Bararia and Mrs.Preeti Vimal Agrawal, Independent Directors as its members and Mr. P. K. Choudhry as Chairman of Committee. The Company Secretary and Compliance officer of the Company acts as the Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee assists the Board in fulfilling its oversight responsibilities with regard to enterprise risk management. The Committee reviews the risk management practices and

Upon the recommendations of Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the Board of Directors of the Company at its meeting held on 30th June, 2023 appointed Mr. Vinay Sarin (DIN: 00090757) as Additional Non-Executive Non-Independent Director of the Company w.e.f. 1st July, 2023, who shall hold office upto the date of ensuing Annual General Meeting of the Company.

The resolutions seeking approval of members for appointment of Mr. Vinay Sarin as Non - Executive Non-Independent Director and re-appointment of Mr. Raghu Mody as Non-Executive Non-Independent Director of the Company along with their brief resume as required under Regulation 36(3) of Listing Regulations and Secretarial Standard – 2 on General Meetings are given in the Notice convening the 59th Annual General Meeting of the Company. The Board recommends their appointment and reappointment respectively.

d) Cessation

There was no cessation from the Board of the Company during the financial year under review. Mr. Raghu Mody stepped down from the executive position (Whole Time Director) of the Company w.e.f. close of business hours of 22nd October, 2022; however, he continues as Non-Executive Non-Independent Director of the Company.

Mr. Vikram Soni, Company Secretary and Compliance Officer of the Company resigned from the services of the Company w.e.f. the close of business hours of 8th October, 2022.

Mr. Pranabh Kapoor, Company Secretary and Compliance Officer of the Company resigned from the



services of the Company w.e.f. the close of business hours of 13th April, 2023.

e) Declaration from Independent Directors

The Company has received declaration from all the Independent Directors of the Company confirming that they meet the criteria of independence as prescribed under Section 149(6) of the Act and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the Listing Regulations and pursuant to the provisions of Regulation 25 of the said Regulations that they are not aware of any circumstance or situation, which exist or may be reasonably anticipated, that could impair or impact their ability to discharge their duties with an objective independent judgment and without any external influence. MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

1. Industry Structure and Development

The financial year 2022-23 was marked by significant global events that had far-reaching consequences on the world economy. Inflation was seen higher than usual in several decades resulted in tightening financial conditions in the most regions. Escalation of the Russia-Ukraine war, China's decision to enforce lockdowns and its zero-Covid policy and European market slow-down collectively created a major global supply chain disruption. This uncertainty made it difficult for businesses to plan and prepare costing scenarios.

Various initiatives taken by global governing bodies are expected to moderate the pertaining economical risks. Monetary policies are expected to restore price stability and fiscal policies expected to aim to alleviate cost pressures while maintaining a sufficiently tight stance. Structural reforms can further support lower inflation by improving productivity and easing supply side constraints.

Global growth is forecast to slow from 6% in 2021 to 3.2% in 2022 and 2.7% in 2023. This is the weakest growth profile since 2001 except for the global financial crisis and the acute phase of Covid-19 pandemic.

Russia-Ukraine conflict continues to overshadow the world economy. Despite recent signs of improvement, recovery over the next two years is expected to be moderate. The outlook remains fragile and downside risks renominate. High uncertainty generated by the war could take a heavy toll on activity. Trade tensions are high and could worsen. Concern is about financial vulnerabilities, housing markets and fiscal balance of low-income countries. While headline inflation has started declining, it remains elevated and could persist longer (Source-OECD).

Indian economy has staged a full recovery in FY 2022-23, ahead of many nations and positioned itself to ascend to the pre-pandemic growth paths. However, Indian must also cope with the challenge of controlling inflation. Fortunately, actions taken by the Government and RBI alongwith decline in global commodity prices has lead retail inflation levels reaching to 5.72% in November 22 and 5.88% in December 22, which are within the RBI upper tolerance target of 6%.

Indian economy experienced an impressive growth of 6.2% in 2022, making it the world's fastest growing major economy. This growth can be partly attributed to the efforts of the private sector in enhancing transportation infrastructure, logistics and overall business eco-system. India's record GST collection and import figures have also contributed to this growth.

Budgeted capital expenditure rose 2.7 times in the last seven years, from FY 16 to FY 23, re-invigorating the Capex cycle. Structural reforms such as the introduction of the Goods and Services Tax and the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code enhanced the efficiency and transparency of the economy and ensured financial discipline and better compliance.

Accordingly, to the IMF's April 2023 report, the Indian economy is projected to grow at a rate of 5.9% in 2023 and 6.3% in 2024. It can be achieved with vigorous credit

disbursal and unfolding of capital investment cycle with strengthening of the balance sheets of the corporate and banking sector. Further support to economic growth will come from the expansion of public digital platforms and path breaking measures such as PM Gati Shakti, the National Logistics Policy and the Production Linked incentive schemes to boost manufacturing output. As per the Indian Brand Equity Foundation (IBEF) in FY 22, investments under PLI programmes totalled INR 47,500 Crores, which reached 106% of the year's set objective. Accordingly Indian economy has begun to prosper with greater financial inclusion and technologically driven economic reforms.

Automotive Sector Overview

The global automotive sector is rapidly transitioning towards cleaner and sustainable transportation with various vehicle types like electric, hybrid-electric and natural gas, despite this diesel and petrol vehicles will continue to play a crucial role. The global automotive industry continued to face challenges due to shortage of semiconductors and other supply chain issues. Situation was further aggravated with lower demand due to major economical slow-down in most of the countries. The global auto industry is likely to witness positive momentum in calendar Year 2023 with recovery in demand and easing of supply chain challenges. Moreover, the mobility landscape continues to transform rapidly with new business models and autonomous, connected, electric, and shared mobility trends which will provide next leg of growth for the industry.

India has become the fastest growing economy in the world in recent years. The fast growth coupled with rising incomes, boost in infrastructure spending and increased manufacturing incentives has accelerated the automobile sector. Indian automobile industry is presently the fifth largest in the world and is expected to become third largest by 2030. The industry contributes around 7.1 % of India's GDP and 49 % of its manufacturing GDP. It provides direct and indirect employment to over 19 million people. The USD 222 billion automobile industry in expected to reach USD 300 billion by 2026. The growth of the sector can be accredited to factors such as increasing disposable incomes, availability of credit and financing options and sense of owning vehicle after pandemic. Further, the Indian Government industry-friendly policies and initiatives are expected to play a significant role in fuelling these developments.

The domestic sale of Automobiles during the financial year 2022-23 vis-a-vis 2021-22 experienced a strong recovery across segments except two wheelers as under:

Passenger vehicle segment grew by 27% with strong underlying demand fuelled by new launches and need for personal mobility post second COVID wave. There was a remarkable growth in Medium & Heavy Commercial vehicle segment by 49% with decent demand in the infrastructure and construction sectors, improving fleet utilisation, freight availability / rates and better financing along with increasing demand for e-commerce & last-mile delivery. Light Commercial Vehicles (LCV) segment reported volume increase of 34% supported by e-commerce, agriculture, and FMCG segment. In the Two-wheelers segment share of scooters and premium motorcycles has been increasing due to strong demand from mid / higher income customers and this trend is expected to persist. EV penetration stands at 5% in FY 23, and it is expected to further increase to 9% in FY 25 with more models' options and favourable cost of ownership in comparison with ICEs.

Indian auto-component industry

India's auto component industry is an important sector driving macroeconomic growth and employment. Significant demand for automobiles also led to the emergence of more original equipment and auto components manufacturers. As a result, India developed expertise in automobiles and auto components which helped boose internal demand for Indian components.

The industry comprises players of all sizes, from large corporations to micro entities, spread across clusters throughout the country. The auto components industry accounted for 2.3% of India's GDP and provide direct employment to 1.5 million people. By 2026, the auto component sector will contribute 5.7% of India's GDP. The overall Indian auto component industry is set to become the 3rd Largest globally by 2025. The Government of India's Automotive Mission Plan (AMP) 2006-26 has been instrument in ensuring growth for the sector.

2. Opportunities and threat

Infrastructure development is a key focus for government with substantial investments being made towards constructing roads, bridges, highways, rail connections, airport and ports. As a result, there is significant increase in demand for commercial vehicles which plays a vital role in transportation and logistics.

As the income levels continue to rise and the number of affluent consumers also increases, the demand for premium passenger vehicles has significantly risen. These consumers are willing to pay more for vehicles advanced safety features, superior comfort and advance information system. In response to this trend, automakers are introducing premium models and variants of their popular passenger vehicle models, effectively catering to India's growing demand.

Indian government's concerted efforts to promote electric vehicles are catalyzing a major transformation in the country's passenger vehicle market. In response to this growing demand, automakers are rolling out electric vehicles in Indian market, while the government is offering incentives to encourage their widespread adoption. India is projected to emerged as the largest market for electric vehicle worldwide by 2030, highlighting the significant moment in the country's electric vehicle ecosystem.

The Commercial vehicle industry is likely to experience a substantial boost by implementing government policies, including incentives to encourage the adoption of electric vehicles, scrappage programs aimed at phasing out older vehicles and regulations regarding load-carrying capacity. These policies can directly help the growth and progress of the commercial vehicle industry. The Government can create a more sustainable and efficient transport system by providing incentives that stimulate the adoption of electric vehicles and elimination of old vehicles. Additionally, regulation concerning load capacity can help improve road safety and reduce wear and tear on infrastructure. Implementation of these policies can continue to a more prosperous and sustainable commercial vehicle industry. Industry is facing few threats as under:

- Rising geo-political tensions over the past few years resulting supply chain disruption and high levels of inflation.
- Shortage of semiconductors continues and poses further challenge.
- Weaking of Indian rupee, though lower than many other currencies
- High interest rate and rising fuel costs may act as dampener.
- Real time driving emission norms from April 23 and safety regulations could pose additional challenges to auto OEMs as it will further increase the cost of vehicles.
- Global slowdown may contract the export business for automotive ancillary players.

At HCL, we took all necessary steps to minimize the impact of price rise with coverage of major raw materials, maintaining higher inventory. We have chosen areas of opportunity within the larger framework of the current challenges. The company has significantly improved its position in OEM, aftermarket and rail segment and reported a sales growth of 29% over the last year.

In the investment segment, the Company's funds are invested in various asset classes including debt and equity. The volatility in the market may adversely affect returns due to Mark to Market losses. To overcome this risk, the Investment Committee reviews the investments on a regular basis and takes appropriate decisions. The portfolio is managed with the advice of professional fund managers.

3. Segment – wise or product-wise performance

The Company operates in two segments viz. composite products and investment. During the year under review, the revenue from composite products stood at ₹ 23,537 Lakhs (previous F.Y. ₹ 18,592 Lakhs) and in the investments segment this stood at ₹ 4,732 Lakhs (previous F.Y.₹ 4,672 Lakhs).

The segment result before unallocable expenses, interest and tax from Composite products was ₹ 1,064 Lakhs (previous- F.Y. ₹ 291 Lakhs) and Investments was ₹ 3,603 Lakhs (previous F.Y. ₹ 3,496 Lakhs).

4. Outlook

Despite geo-political tensions and global slowdown, we are optimistic about the prospects of Indian economy and the automotive segment. Indian Auto component industry has emerged as a strong growth driver and expected to become



the third largest in the world by 2025 and component exports are expected to grow by five times in 10 years. Keeping pace with the automotive industry, India's auto component industry has been flourishing and some favorable trends are as under:

- Growing income levels and overall improved employment trend will help increase the consumer base.
- The Indian automotive ancillary sector is estimated to grow by 14-16% in FY 2022-23. An increase in production of passenger and commercial vehicles in FY 2022-23 could help the demand form OEM to grow by 18-20%.
- The demand growth for After-market is estimated to be 6-7% this fiscal.
- The export market witnesses 40 % growth in FY 2021-22 and expected to increase 8-10 % in FY 2022-23 owing to stable demand from the European and US markets.
- India's EV markets have also seen strong growth with electric 2 W volumes witnessing exponential growth in the recent years.
- Allocation of large amount towards Semiconductor Mission will help develop on indigenous semiconductor manufacturing base and reduce import dependence.
- Government of India's Automotive Mission Plan 2006-26 has been instrumental in ensuring growth for the sector,
- Introduction of PLI scheme in auto and auto component with an approved financial outlay over 5-year period.
- Huge spending by Government toward infrastructure in all segments viz road, rail, water and other sectors.
- Introduction of high-speed trains and dedicated freight corridor (DFC)
- · NBFCs are stepping up the funding of used vehicles.

The above factors will spur the demand for the Company's products used in segments like Heavy Commercial Vehicles, tractors, railroad and industry. Our company will remain a part of this change with appropriate products and solutions for customers. The Company will continue to put a thrust on new product development to meet the changed requirement of customers, provide better customer service and continue to work towards up-gradation of technology, improvement in quality, cost rationalization, cash preservation and digitalization. Besides, the Company will aggressively pursue opportunities for new OEM approvals, improve market share in OE and Aftermarket, export opportunities and additional business from the Rail and Industrial segment.

5. Risks and concerns

The Company has laid down a well-defined Risk Management Policy covering risk mapping, trend analysis, risk exposure, potential impact and risk mitigation process. A detailed exercise is carried out from time to time to identify and evaluate both business and non-business risk. The Board periodically reviews the risks and suggests steps to be taken to control and mitigate the same through a properly defined framework.

6. Internal control systems and their adequacy

The Company has in place proper and adequate internal control systems commensurate with the nature of its business, size and complexity of its business operations.

Internal control systems comprising of policies and procedures are designed to ensure reliability of financial reporting, compliance with policies, procedures, applicable laws and regulations and that all assets and resources are acquired economically, used efficiently and are adequately protected.

7. Discussion on financial performance with respect to operational performance

The Company's financial performance with respect to Operational performance is already discussed in the Director's Report which forms a part of the Annual Report.

8. Material developments in Human Resources / Industrial Relations front, including number of people employed

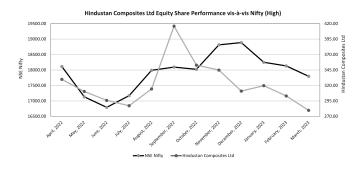

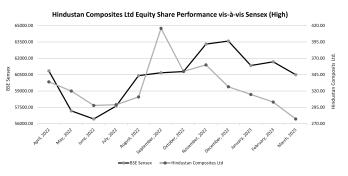

As disclosed in Note no. 3 and 8, as at March 31, 2023 the Company has unquoted equity /debt Investments of Rs. 27,966.89 Lakhs. These Investments are classified and measured at Fair value through profit or loss /fair value through other comprehensive income.

We focused on valuation of these instruments/investments and have carried out the following key audit procedures:

- Understood the Company's process and procedures and tested controls to ensure proper classification and valuation/ impairment of investments.
- Tested recording of investments on sample basis and verified classification of investments.
- Assessed valuation of these investments to examine whether the same is in accordance with the Company's accounting policies.
- Tested impairment/provision of investments (including reversal)
- In respect of unlisted and other than actively traded investments, we evaluated the Company's valuation methodology and

the use of judgmental assumptions in valuation/impairment and not on quoted prices in active markets. Therefore, there is significant measurement uncertainty involved in this valuation/impairment. As a result, the valuation/impairment of these instruments was significant to our audit.

- assumptions and corroborated these with internal Investment policies including those related to impairment.
- For any changes in ratings of the investee company, we examined the Company's assessment with the internal Investment policies for reclassification and valuation.
- Also obtained external evidence of existence of investment by getting holding statement from the custodian /statement from the fund houses as well through publicly available filings from time to time
- We have also perused the relevant internal audit reports on investments.

Based on the work carried out, we did not come across any significant matter which suggests that the investments were not properly classified or valued.

Information Other than the Standalone Financial Statements and Auditor's report thereon

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

A Company's internal financial control over financial reporting includes those policies and procedures that (1) pertain to the maintenance of records that, in reasonable detail, accurately and fairly reflect the transactions and dispositions of the assets of the company; (2) provide reasonable assurance that transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and that receipts and expenditures of the entity are being made only in accordance with authorisations of management; (3) provide reasonable assurance regarding prevention or timely detection of unauthorised acquisition, use, or disposition of the entity's assets that could have a material effect on the standalone financial statements; and (4) also provide reasonable assurance by the internal auditors through their internal audit reports given to the organisation from time to time.



Inherent Limitations of Internal Financial Controls Over Financial Reporting

Because of the inherent limitations of internal financial controls over financial reporting, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projections of any evaluation of the internal financial controls over financial reporting to future periods are subject to the risk that the internal financial control over financial reporting may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.

Opinion

Notes of the Standalone Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March, 2023

CORPORATE OVERVIEW:

Hindustan Composites Limited ("the Company") is a public limited company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provision of the Companies Act applicable in India. Its shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) and National Stock Exchange (NSE) of India.

The registered office of the Company is located at Peninsula Business Park, A Tower, 8th Floor, Senapati Bapat Marg, Lower Parel, Mumbai 400 013 (Maharastra).

The Company is engaged in the business of manufacturing and marketing of fibre based friction material, consisting of Brake Liners, Roll Lining, Brake Block, Clutch Facing etc and investments.

A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2023

a) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements:

These standalone financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read with rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting standards) Rules, 2015 and amendment rules issued there after

The financial statements of the Company are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and historical cost convention except for the following material items that have been measured at fair value as required by the relevant Ind AS:

- Certain financial assets and liabilities are measured at Fair value (refer note no. 43 financial instruments)
- ii) Defined benefit employee plan (refer note no. 42)

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current or noncurrent classification of assets and liabilities.

b) Use of estimates and judgments:

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. The recognition, measurement, classification or disclosure of an item or information in the financial statements is made relying on these estimates.

The estimates and judgements used in the preparation of the financial statements are continuously evaluated by the Company and are based on historical experience and various other assumptions and factors (including expectations of future events) that the Company believes to be reasonable under the existing circumstances. Actual results may differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively in current and future periods.

Critical accounting judgements and key source of estimation uncertainty

The Company is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates

and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and

other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future period, if the revision affects current and future periods.

(a) Depreciation / amortisation and useful lives of property plant and equipment and intangible assets

Property, plant and equipment and intangible assets are depreciated / amortised over their estimated useful lives, after taking into account its estimated residual value. Management reviews the estimated useful lives and residual values of the assets annually in order to determine the amount of depreciation / amortisation to be recorded during any reporting period. The useful lives and residual values are based on the Company's historical experience with similar assets and take into account anticipated technological changes. The depreciation / amortisation for future periods is revised if there are significant changes from previous estimates. Depreciation on the fixed assets added / disposed off/ discarded during the year is provided on pro-rata basis with reference to the month of addition / disposal / discarding.

(b) Provisions and liabilities

Provisions and liabilities are recognized in the period when it becomes probable that there will be a future outflow of funds resulting from past operations or events that can reasonably be estimated. The timing of recognition requires application of judgement to existing facts and circumstances which may be subject to change. The amounts are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

(c) Contingencies

In the normal course of business, contingent liabilities may arise from litigation and other claims against the Company. Potential liabilities that are possible but not probable of crystallising or are very difficult to quantify reliably are treated as contingent liabilities. Such liabilities are disclosed in the notes but are not recognized in the financial statements.

(d) Measurement of defined benefit obligations

The present value of the defined benefit obligations depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis. The assumptions used in determining the net interest cost/(income) for defined benefit plans include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions will impact the carrying amount of defined benefit obligations.

c) Property, plant and equipment and Intangible assets

Property, plant and equipment

Freehold land is carried at cost. All other items of property, plant and equipment are measured at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Costs include freight, import duties, non-refundable GST and other expenses directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.



Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognised when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance expenses are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

The cost of property, plant and equipment which are not ready for their intended use before such date, are disclosed as capital work-in-progress.

The Company assesses at each Balance Sheet date whether there is any indication that any asset may be impaired. If any, such indication exists, the carrying value of such asset is reduced to its recoverable amount and the impairment loss is charged to profit and loss account. If at the balance Sheet date there is any deduction that a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, then such loss is reversed and the asset is restated to that effect.

Intangible assets:

Technical Know How and Computer software are stated at cost, less accumulated amortisation and impairments, if any.

Depreciation/ amortisation methods, estimated useful lives and residual value

Depreciation is provided on a Straight Line Method, over the estimated useful lives of assets. Leasehold land is amortised over period of lease. Leasehold improvements are amortised over the period of lease or estimated useful lives which ever is lower.

The company depreciates its property, plant and equipment over the useful life in the manner prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 and management believe that useful lives of assets are same as those prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Company amortizes computer software with a useful life using the straight-line method over the period of 6 years from the date of acquisition.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Assets held for sale

Non-current assets or disposal groups comprising of assets and liabilities are classified as 'held for sale' when all of the following criteria's are met:

- (I) decision has been made to sell.
- (ii) the assets are available for immediate sale in its present condition.
- (iii) the assets are being actively marketed and
- (iv) sale has been agreed or is expected to be concluded within 12 months of the Balance Sheet date.

Subsequently, such non-current assets and disposal groups classified as 'held for sale' are measured at the lower of its carrying value and fair value less costs to sell. Non-current assets held for sale are not depreciated or amortised.

d) As a lessee

Operating Lease

The Company, as a lessee, recognises a right-of-use asset and

a lease liability for its leasing arrangements, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset. The contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, if it involves the use of an identified asset and the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset and has right to direct the use of the identified asset. The cost of the right-of-use asset shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made on or before the commencement date plus any initial direct costs incurred. The right-of-use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The rightof-use assets is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the shorter of lease term or useful life of right-of-use asset. The Company measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses incremental borrowing rate. For short-term and low value leases, the Company recognises the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

e) Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and deposits which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value and have an original maturity of three months or less, including money market deposits, commercial paper and investments. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the balance sheet.

f) Inventories:

Inventories of Raw Materials, Work-in-Progress, Stores and Spares and Finished Goods are stated 'at cost or net realisable value, whichever is lower'. Cost comprise all cost of purchase, cost of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Cost formula used is 'Weighted Average cost'. Due allowance is estimated and made for defective and obsolete items, wherever necessary, based on the past experience of the Company.

g) Financial Instruments

Financial assets - Initial recognition

Financial assets are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial assets other than trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs for all financial assets not carried at fair value through profit or loss. Financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value, and transaction costs are expensed in the statement of profit and loss.

Subsequent measurement

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss on the basis of both (a) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset

(i) Measured at amortised cost:

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised



cost, if these financial assets are held within a business module whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified date to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

(ii) Measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI):

Financial assets are measured at FVTOCI, if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that give rise on specified dates to solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and by selling financial assets.

(iii) Measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL):

Financial assets other than equity instrument are measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI on initial recognition. Such financial assets are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value, including interest income and dividend income if any, recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Equity instruments:

The company subsequently measures all equity investments at fair value. Where the Company's management has elected to present fair value gains and losses on equity investments in other comprehensive income, there is no subsequent reclassification of fair value gains and losses to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Dividends from such investments are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as other income when the Company's right to receive payments is established.

Impairment

The Company assesses on a forward looking basis the expected credit losses associated with its financial assets carried at amortised cost and FVTOCI debt instruments. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk.

For trade receivables only, the Company applies the simplified approach permitted by Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables. The impairment losses and reversals are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

De-recognition

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers rights to receive cash flows from an asset, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.

On de-recognition of equity instruments measured at FVTOCI, the cumulative gain or loss previously reconised in other comprehensive income is reclassified from other equity to retain earning as a reclassification adjustment.

Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value net of transaction costs for all financial liabilities not carried at fair value through profit or loss.

Financial liabilities measured at amortised cost are subsequently measured at using EIR method. Financial liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

De-recognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Balance Sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

Derivative financial instruments:

Derivative financial instruments such as future contracts are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value with changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period when they arise.

h) Fair Value Measurement

The Company measures financial instruments, such as, derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

✓ In the principal market for the asset or liability, or

✓ In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their best economic interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:



✓ Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

 \checkmark Level 2 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable

 \checkmark Level 3 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

i) Borrowings:

Borrowings are initially recognised at net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption amount is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method.

j) Borrowing costs:

General and specific borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are capitalised during the period of time that is required to complete and prepare the asset for its intended use or sale. Qualifying assets are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale.

Other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

k) Provisions and contingent liabilities:

Provisions for legal claims, volume discounts and returns are recognised when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses. The carrying amounts of provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period. The discount rate used to determine the present value is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

A disclosure for contingent liabilities is made where there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may probably not require an outflow of resources or an obligation for which the f

future outcome cannot be ascertained with reasonable certainty. When there is a possible or a present obligation where the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

I) Revenue recognition:

The Company recognizes revenue, whenever control over distinct goods or services is transferred to the customer i.e. when the customer is able to direct the use of the transferred goods or services and obtains substantially all of the remaining benefits, provided a contract with enforceable rights and obligations exists and amongst others collectability of consideration is probable taking into account customer 's creditworthiness.

Revenue is the transaction price the Company expects to be entitled to. In determining the transaction price, the Company considers effects of variable consideration, the existence of significant financing contracts, noncash consideration and consideration payable to the customer, if any. The Company considers whether there are other promises in the contract that are separate performance obligations to which the transaction price needs to be allocated (e.g. warranties etc.).

i) Variable Consideration:

If the consideration in a contract includes a variable amount, the company estimates the amount of consideration to which it will be entitled to in exchange for transferring goods to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and constrained until it is highly probable that a significant reversal of revenue will not occur once associated uncertainties are resolved. Some contracts with the customers provide them with a right to return and volume rebates. The right to return and volume rebates gives rise to variable consideration.

The amount of variable consideration is calculated by either using the expected value or the most likely amount depending on which is expected to better predict the amount of variable consideration. Consideration is also adjusted for the time value of money if the period between the transfer of goods or services and the receipt of payment exceeds twelve months and there is a significant financing benefit either to the customer or the Company. If a contract contains more than one distinct good or service, the transaction price is allocated to each performance obligation based on relative stand-alone selling prices are not observable, the Company reasonably estimates those revenue is recognized for each performance obligation either at a point in time or over time.

ii) Sale of goods:

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the control of the goods passes to the buyer either at the time of dispatch or delivery or when the risk of loss transfers. Export sales are recognized based on the shipped on board date as per bill of lading, which is when substantial risks and rewards of ownership are passed to the customers.

Revenue from sale of goods is net of taxes and recovery of charges collected from customers like transport, packing etc. Provision is made for returns when appropriate. Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable and is net of price discounts, allowance for volume rebates and similar items.

Claims / Refunds not ascertainable with reasonable certainty are accounted for, on final settlement and are recognized as revenue.



iii) Rendering of services:

Revenue from sale of services are recognized when the services are rendered.

iv) Investment Income:

Dividend income on investments is recognised when the right to receive dividend is established.

Interest income is recognized on a time proportionate basis taking into account the amounts invested and the rate of interest. For all financial instruments measured at amortised cost, interest income is recorded using the Effective interest rate methor to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

m) Employee Benefits:

The Company provides following post-employment plans: (i) Defined benefit plans such as gratuity

(ii) Defined contribution plans such as Provident fund

a) Defined-benefit plan:

The liability or asset recognised in the balance sheet in respect of defined benefit gratuity plan is the present value of defined benefit obligations at the end of the reporting period less fair value of the plan assets. The defined benefit obligations is calculated annually by actuaries using the projected unit credit method.

The Company recognises the following changes in the net defined benefit obligation as an expense in the statement of profit and loss:

- (a) Service costs comprising current service costs, pastservice costs, gains and losses on curtailment and nonroutine settlements; and
- (b) Net interest expense or income

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and fair value of the plan assets. This cost is included in employee benefit expenses in the statement of the profit & loss.

Re-measurement comprising of actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustment and changes in actuarial assumptions, the effect of asset excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability and the return on plan assets (excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability) ceiling are recognised in the period in which they occur directly in Other comprehensive income. Re-measurement are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods.

b) Defined-contribution plan:

Under defined contribution plans, provident fund, the Company pays pre-defined amounts to separate funds and does not have any legal or informal obligation to pay additional sums. These comprise of contributions to the employees' provident fund with the government, superannuation fund and certain state plans like Employees' State Insurance and Employees' Pension Scheme. The Company's payments to the defined contribution plans are recognised as expenses during the period in which the employees perform the services that the payment covers.

c) Other employee benefit

Compensated absences which are not expected to occur within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employee renders the related services are recognised as a liability at the present value of the obligation as at the Balance sheet date based on an actuarial valuation.

n) Foreign Currency Transaction:

The financial statements are presented in Indian rupee (INR), which is company's functional and presentation currency.

Foreign exchange differences regarded as an adjustment to borrowing costs are presented in the statement of profit and loss, within finance costs. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the statement of profit and loss as other income / miscellaneous expenses.

At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined.

o) Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current tax expense and the net change in the deferred tax asset or liability during the year. Current and deferred taxes are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in such case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is measured at the amount of tax expected to be payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961. Deferred income tax is recognised using the Balance Sheet approach. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible and taxable temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and liabilities and their carrying amount, except when the deferred income tax arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss at the time of the transaction.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that either future taxable profits or reversal of deferred tax liabilities will be available, against which the deductible temporary differences and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset shall be reviewed at the end of each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period and are expected to apply when the related deferred tax asset is realised or the deferred tax liability is settled.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are off set when there is a legally enforceable right to off set current tax assets and liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority.

Minimum Alternative Tax ('MAT') credit is recognised as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income-tax during the specified period. In the year in which the MAT credit becomes eligible to be recognised as an asset, the said asset is created by way of a credit to the statement of profit and loss. The Company reviews the same at each balance sheet date and writes down the carrying amount of MAT credit entitlement to the extent there is no longer convincing evidence to the effect that Company will pay normal income-tax during the specified period.



p) Segment Reporting:

The Company has identified its Managing Director as the Chief Operating Decision Maker. Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to managing director of the Company. The Managing Director evaluates the Company's performance and allocates resources as a whole.

g) Research and Development:

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Product development costs are expensed as incurred unless technical and commercial feasibility of the project is demonstrated, further economic benefits are probable, the Company has an intention and ability to complete and use or sell the product and the costs can be measured reliably.

r) Earnings Per Share:

Basic EPS is arrived at based on net profit or (loss) after taxation available to equity shareholders to the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

The diluted EPS is calculated on the same basis as basic EPS, after adjusting for the effects of potential dilutive equity shares unless impact is anti-dilutive.

s) Contract balances:

i) Trade Receivables:

A receivable represents the Company's right to an amount of consideration that is unconditional (i.e. only a passage of time is required to before payment of the consideration is due).

ii) Contract liabilities:

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the company transfer goods and services to the customer, a contract liability

is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due, whichever is earlier. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the company performs under the contract.

t) Recent Accounting Pronouncements:

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standard or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. On March 31, 2023, MCA amended the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 by issuing the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2023, applicable from April 1, 2023, as below:

Ind AS 1 – Presentation of Financial Statements The amendments require companies to disclose their material accounting policies rather than their significant accounting policies. Accounting policy information, together with other information, is material when it can reasonably be expected to influence decisions of primary users of general purpose financial statements.

Ind AS 8 – Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

The definition of a "change in accounting estimates" has been replaced with a definition of "accounting estimates". Accounting estimates are defined as "monetary amounts in financial statements that are subject to measurement uncertainty". Entities develop accounting estimates if accounting policies require items in financial statements to be measured in a way that involves measurement uncertainty.

Ind AS 12-Income Taxes

The amendments clarify how companies account for deferred tax on transactions such as leases and decommissioning obligations. The amendments narrowed the scope of the Initial recognition exemption of Ind AS 12 so that it no longer applies to transactions that, on initial recognition, give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences. Accordingly, companies will need to recognise a deferred tax asset and a deferred tax liability for temporary differences arising on transactions such as initial recognition of a lease and a decommissioning provision.

42 Employee Benefits

(a) Defined contribution plan

In accordance with the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972, the Company provides for gratuity for employees who are in continuous services for a period of 5 years are eligible for gratuity. The amount of gratuity payable on termination/retirement is employees last drawn salary per month computed proportionately for 15 days salary multiplied for the number of years of service. The gratuity is a funded plan and the Company make contributions to recognised funds in India.

45 Risk Management

Financial risk management objective and policies

The Company's financial risk management is an integral part of how to plan and execute its business strategies. The Company's financial risk management policy is set by the Managing Board. The risk management policies aims to mitigate the following risk arising from the financial instruments: (a) Market risk; (b) Liquidity risk and (c) Credit risk.

Financial risk factors

The Company's principal financial liabilities comprise borrowings, deposits from dealers and trade and other payables. (b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: interest rate risk, currency risk and price risk, such as equity price risk and commodity risk. Financial instruments affected by market risk includes investment, deposits, foreign currency receivables and payables. The value of a financial instrument may change as a result of changes in the interest rates, foreign currency exchange rates, equity prices and other market changes that affect market risk sensitive instruments. The Company's treasury team manages the Market risk, which evaluates and exercises independent control over the entire process of market risk management.

(i) Foreign currency risk

Foreign currency risk can only arise on financial instruments that are denominated in a currency other than the functional currency in which they are measured. The Company's functional and presentation currency is INR. The Company does have transactions in currency other than functional currency i.e. in US Dollar (USD) for purchase of raw material from overseas supplier. However, those are not very significant considering the nature and size of the operations of the Company.

(c) Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the possibility that the counter party may not be able to settle their obligations as agreed. To manage this, the Company periodically assess financial reliability of counter party, taking into account the financial condition, current economic trends, and analysis of historical bad debts and ageing of accounts receivable. The Company considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of assets and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risks on an on-going basis throughout each reporting period.

To assess whether there is a significant change increase in credit risk the Company compares the risks of default occurring on the assets as at the reporting date with the risk of default as at the date of initial recognition. It considers the reasonable and supportive forward looking information such as:

- (i) Actual or expected significant adverse changes in business.
- (ii) Actual or expected significant changes in the operating results of the counterparty.
- (iii) Financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the counterparty's ability to meet its obligations
- (iv) Significant increase in credit risk on other financial instruments of same counterparty
- (i) Expected credit loss for trade receivables under simplified approach (Refer Note 9 for ageing of Trade Receivable)

To The Members Of Hindustan Composites Limited

Opinion

Report on the Audit of Consolidated Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of **Hindustan Composites Limited and its Joint Venture** (the Holding Company and its Joint Venture together referred to as "the Group"), which comprises of Consolidated Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2023, the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, Other Comprehensive Income, the Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity and the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flow for the year then ended (Refer "Other Matters" section below), and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the consolidated financial statements").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid consolidated financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under Section 133 of the Act read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Group as at March 31, 2023, its consolidated profits, consolidated other comprehensive income, consolidated changes in equity and its consolidated cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Group in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the consolidated financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules made thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the consolidated financial statements.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current year. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the consolidated financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Key Audit Matters

Classification, Valuation and Impairment of unquoted equity instruments /debt Investments:

The Group's substantial assets are investments and unquoted equity/debt Instruments consist of 34.66% of total amount of investments held as on March 31,2023. As disclosed in Note no. 3 and 8, as at March 31, 2023 the Company has unquoted equity /debt Investments of Rs. 27,966.89 Lakhs. These Investments are classified and measured at Fair value through profit or loss /fair value through other comprehensive income.

How our audit addressed the key audit matters

We focused on valuation of these instruments/ investments and have carried out the following key audit procedures:

- Understood the Company's process and procedures and tested controls to ensure proper classification and valuation/ impairment of investments.
- Tested recording of investments on sample basis and verified classification of investments.
- Assessed valuation of these investments to examine whether the same is in accordance with the Company's accounting policies.



Due to their unique structure and terms which involve the use of judgmental assumptions in valuation/impairment and not on quoted prices in active markets. Therefore, there is significant measurement uncertainty involved in this valuation/impairment. As a result, the valuation/impairment of these instruments was significant to our audit.

- Tested impairment/provision of investments (including reversal)
- In respect of unlisted and other than actively traded investments, we evaluated the Company's valuation methodology and assumptions and corroborated these with internal Investment policies including those related to impairment.
- For any changes in ratings of the investee company, we examined the Company's assessment with the internal Investment policies for reclassification and valuation.
- Also obtained external evidence of existence of investment by getting holding statement from the custodian /statement from the fund houses as well through publicly available filings from time to time
- We have also perused the relevant internal audit reports on investments.

Based on the work carried out, we did not come across any significant matter which suggests that the investments were not properly classified or valued.

Information Other than the Consolidated Financial Statements and Auditor's report thereon

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation of other information. The Other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to the Board report, Corporate Governance report and Shareholder's information, but does not include the consolidated financial statement and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and those charged with Governance for the Consolidated Financial Statements

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in Section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position, consolidated financial performance (including consolidated other comprehensive income), consolidated changes in equity and consolidated cash flows of the Group in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Account) Rules, 2014.

This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Group and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities;



selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, the respective Board of Directors of the Companies included in the Group are responsible for assessing the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Group or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The respective Board of Directors of the Companies included in the Group are also responsible for overseeing the reporting process of the Group.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these consolidated financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the consolidated financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

Materiality is the magnitude of misstatements in the consolidated financial statements that individually or in aggregate makes it probable that the economic decisions of a reasonably knowledgeable user of the financial statements may be influenced. We consider quantitative materiality and qualitative factors in (i) planning the scope pf our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work and (ii) to evaluate the effect of any identified misstatements in the consolidated financial statements.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Other Matters

- (a) The opening balances and comparative consolidated financial information of the Group for the year ended March 31, 2022 has been audited by the predecessor auditor who has expressed an unmodified opinion on those financial statements vide their report dated May 26, 2022 and opening balances have been considered based on such audited consolidated financial statements.
- (b) The financial statements of the joint venture included in the consolidated financial statements (whose losses have exceeded the Group's investments) and therefore, have not been considered in the consolidated financial statements in compliance with IND AS 28. (Refer note no 38 to the consolidated financial statements).

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements below, is not modified in respect of the above matters with respect to our reliance on the work done and the reports of the other auditor.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

- 1. As required by Section 143(3) of the Act, we report that:
 - (a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit.
 - (b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Group so far as it appears from our examination of those books and records.
 - (c) The Consolidated Balance sheet, the Consolidated Statement of Profit & Loss (including consolidated other comprehensive income), Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity and the Consolidated Cash Flow Statement dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of account.
 - (d) In our opinion, the aforesaid consolidated financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Account) Rules, 2014.
 - (e) On the basis of the written representations received from the directors of the Holding Company as on March 31, 2023, taken on record by the Board of Directors of the Holding Company and its Joint Venture incorporated in India, none of the directors of the Group companies is disqualified as on March 31, 2023 from being appointed as a director in terms of Section 164 (2) of the Act.
 - (f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls over financial reporting of the Company and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate Report in Annexure "A".



- (g) In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the remuneration paid by the Holding Company to its directors during the year is in accordance with the provisions of Section 197(16) of the Act.
- (h) With respect to the matters to be included in the Auditor's report in accordance with the Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:
 - I. The Group has disclosed the impact of pending litigations on its consolidated financial position in its consolidated financial statements. [Refer Note No.33 to the Consolidated financial statements]
 - ii. The Group did not have any long-term contracts including derivative contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses.
 - iii. There has been no delay in transferring amounts, required to be transferred, to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Group.

[Refer note no 53 (f) to standalone financial statements].
 - c) Based on the audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representation under sub clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e) of The Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, as provided under (a) and (b) above, contains any material misstatement.
 - v. a) The final dividend paid by the Holding Company during the year declared for the previous year is in accordance with Section 123 of the Act to the extent it applies to payment of dividend.
 - b) The Board of Directors of the Holding Company has proposed final dividend for the year which is subject to the approval of the Members at the ensuing annual general meeting. The dividend recommended by the Board is in accordance with Section 123 of the Act to the extent it applies to the recommendation of dividend [Refer note no 46 (b) to standalone financial statements].
 - vi With respect to the matters specified in paragraph 3(xxi) and 4 of the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order 2020 (the "Order"/ "CARO"), issued by the Central Government in terms of Section 143(11) of the Act, based on the CARO reports issued of Holding Company and its Joint Venture incorporated in

Notes of the Standalone Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March, 2023

CORPORATE OVERVIEW:

The consolidated financial statements comprise financial statements of Hindustan Composites Limited is a public limited company and its joint venture, namely Compo Advics (India) Pvt. Ltd., (collectively referred to as "the Group") for the year ended 31 March 2023. The Group's share in the Joint Venture is 49%.

Hindustan Composites Limited ("the Group") is a public limited Group domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provision of the Companies Act applicable in India. Its shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) and National Stock Exchange (NSE) of India.

The registered office of the Holding Company is located at Peninsula Business Park, A Tower, 8th Floor, Senapati Bapat Marg, Lower Parel, Mumbai 400 013.

The Group is engaged in the business of manufacturing and marketing of fibre based friction material, consisting of Brake Liners, Roll Lining, Brake Block, Clutch Facing, Disc Brakes Pads etc and investments.

A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

a) Basis Of Preparation of Financial Statements:

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'IndAS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read with rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting standards) Rules, 2015 and amendment rules issued there after.

The consolidated financial statements of the Group are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and Historical cost convention except for the following material items that have been measured at fair value as required by the relevant lnd AS:

- Certain financial assets and liabilities are measured at Fair value
- ii) Defined benefit employee plan

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non current as per the Group's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents, the Group has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

b) Uses of estimates and judgments:

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Management to make ,judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. The recognition, measurement, classification or disclosure of an item or information in the financial statements is made relying on these estimates.

The estimates and judgements used in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements are continuously evaluated by the Group and are based on historical experience and various other assumptions and factors (including expectations of future events) that the Group believes to be reasonable under the existing circumstances.

Actual results may differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively in current and future periods.

Critical accounting judgements and key source of estimation uncertainty

The Group is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future period, if the revision affects current and future periods.

(a) Depreciation / amortisation and useful lives of property Plant and equipment and intangible assets

Property, plant and equipment and intangible assets are depreciated / amortised over their estimated useful lives, after taking into account its estimated residual value. Management reviews the estimated useful lives and residual values of the assets annually in order to determine the amount of depreciation / amortisation to be recorded during any reporting period. The useful lives and residual values are based on the Group's historical experience with similar assets and take into account anticipated technological changes. The depreciation / amortisation for future periods is revised if there are significant changes from previous estimates. Depreciation on the fixed assets added / disposed off/ discarded during the year is provided on pro-rata basis with reference to the month of addition / disposal / discarding.

(b) Provisions and liabilities

Provisions and liabilities are recognized in the period when it becomes probable that there will be a future outflow of funds resulting from past operations or events that can reasonably be estimated. The timing of recognition requires application of judgement to existing facts and circumstances which may be subject to change. The amounts are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

(c) Contingencies

In the normal course of business, contingent liabilities may arise from litigation and other claims against the Group. Potential liabilities that are possible but not probable of crystallising or are very difficult to quantify reliably are treated as contingent liabilities. Such liabilities are disclosed in the notes but are not recognized in the financial statements.

(d) Measurement of defined benefit obligations

The present value of the defined benefit obligations depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis. The assumptions used in determining the net interest cost/(income) for defined benefit plans include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions will impact the carrying amount of defined benefit obligations.

c) Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the Group as at 31 March 2023.

Investment in joint venture:

A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have



joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint arrangement. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The results and assets and liabilities of associates or joint ventures are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting.

Under the equity method, an investment in an associate or a joint venture is initially recognised in the consolidated balance sheet at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the associate or joint venture. When the Group's share of losses of an associate or a joint venture exceeds the Group's interest in that associate or joint venture (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the associate or joint venture), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate or joint venture.

An investment in an associate or a joint venture is accounted for using the equity method from the date on which the investee becomes an associate or a joint venture. On acquisition of the investment in an associate or a joint venture, any excess of the cost of the investment over the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities of the investee is recognised as goodwill, which is included within the carrying amount of the investment. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of the investment, after reassessment, is recognised directly in equity as capital reserve in the period in which the investment is acquired.

After application of the equity method of accounting, the Group determines whether there is any objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the net investment in an associate or a joint venture and that event (or events) has an impact on the estimated future cash flows from the net investment that can be reliably estimated. If there exists such an objective evidence of impairment, then it is necessary to recognise impairment loss with respect to the Group's investment in an associate or a joint venture.

Distributions received from an associate or a joint venture reduce the carrying amount of the investment. Unrealised gains on transactions between the group and its associates and joint ventures are eliminated to the extent of the group's interest in these entities. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transactions provides evidence of an impairment of the assets transferred.

Consolidated financial statements are prepared using uniform accounting policies for like transactions and other events in similar circumstances. If a member of the group uses accounting policies other than those adopted in the consolidated financial statements for like transactions and events in similar circumstances, appropriate adjustments are made to that group member's financial statements in preparing the consolidated financial statements to ensure conformity with the group's accounting policies.

d) Property, plant and equipment and Intangible assets

Property, plant and equipment

Freehold land is carried at cost. All other items of property, plant and equipment are measured at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Costs include freight, import duties, non-refundable purchase taxes and other expenses directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The

carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognised when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

The cost of property, plant and equipment which are not ready for their intended use before such date, are disclosed as capital work-in-progress

The Group assesses at each Balance Sheet date whether there is any indication that any asset may be impaired. If any, such indication exists, the carrying value of such asset is reduced to its recoverable amount and the impairment loss is charged to profit and loss account. If at the balance Sheet date there is any deduction that a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, then such loss is reversed and the asset is restated to that effect.

Intangible assets:

Technical Know How and Computer software are stated at cost, less accumulated amortisation and impairments, if any.

Depreciation/ amortisation methods, estimated useful lives and residual value

Depreciation is provided on a Straight Line Method, over the estimated useful lives of assets. Leasehold land is amortised over period of lease. Leasehold improvements are amortised over the period of lease or estimated useful lives which ever is lower.

The Group depreciates its property, plant and equipment over the useful life in the manner prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 and management believe that useful lives of assets are same as those prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Group amortizes computer software with a useful life using the straight-line method over the period of 6 years from the date of acquisition.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Assets held for sale

Non-current assets or disposal groups comprising of assets and liabilities are classified as 'held for sale' when all of the following criteria's are met:

- (i) decision has been made to sell.
- (ii) the assets are available for immediate sale in its present condition.
- (iii) the assets are being actively marketed and
- (iv) sale has been agreed or is expected to be concluded within 12 months of the Balance Sheet date.

Subsequently, such non-current assets and disposal groups classified as 'held for sale' are measured at the lower of its carrying value and fair value less costs to sell. Non-current assets held for sale are not depreciated or amortised.

e) As a lessee

Operating Lease

The Group, as a lessee, recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability for its leasing arrangements, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset. The contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, if it involves the use of an identified asset and the Group has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset and has right to direct the use of the identified asset. The



cost of the right-of-use asset shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made on or before the commencement date plus any initial direct costs incurred. The right-of-use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The rightof-use assets is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the shorter of lease term or useful life of right-of-use asset. The Group measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Group uses incremental borrowing rate. For short-term and low value leases, the Group recognises the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

f) Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and deposits which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value and have an original maturity of three months or less, including money market deposits, commercial paper and investments. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the balance sheet.

g) Inventories:

Inventories of Raw Materials, Work-in-Progress, Stores and spares and Finished Goods are stated 'at cost or net realisable value, whichever is lower'. Cost comprise all cost of purchase, cost of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. The Goods and Service Tax (GST) in respect of closing inventory of finished goods is included as part of finished goods. Cost formula used is 'Weighted Average cost'. Due allowance is estimated and made for defective and obsolete items, wherever necessary, based on the past experience of the Group.

h) Financial Instruments

Financial assets - Initial recognition

Financial assets are recognised when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial assets other than trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs for all financial assets not carried at fair value through profit or loss. Financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value, and transaction costs are expensed in the statement of profit and loss.

Subsequent measurement

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss on the basis of both (a) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

(i) Measured at amortised cost:

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost, if these financial assets are held within a business module whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified date to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

(ii) Measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI):

Financial assets are measured at FVTOCI, if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that give rise on specified dates to solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and by selling financial assets.

(iii) Measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL):

Financial assets other than equity instrument are measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI on initial recognition. Such financial assets are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value, including interest income and dividend income if any, recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Equity instruments:

The Group subsequently measures all equity investments at fair value. Where the Group's management has elected to present fair value gains and losses on equity investments in other comprehensive income, there is no subsequent reclassification of fair value gains and losses to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Dividends from such investments are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as other income when the Group's right to receive payments is established.

Impairment

The Group assesses on a forward looking basis the expected credit losses associated with its financial assets carried at amortised cost and FVTOCI debt instruments. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk.

For trade receivables only, the Group applies the simplified approach permitted by Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables. The impairment losses and reversals are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

De-recognition

The Group derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers rights to receive cash flows from an asset, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Group continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Group's continuing involvement. In that case, the Group also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Group has retained.

Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are recognised when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value net of transaction costs for all financial liabilities not carried at fair value through profit or loss.

Financial liabilities measured at amortised cost are subsequently measured at using EIR method. Financial liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

De-recognition A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms or the terms of an



existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Derivative financial instruments:

Derivative financial instruments such as future contracts are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value with changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period when they arise.

i) Fair Value Measurement

The Group measures financial instruments, such as, derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- ✓ In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Group.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their best economic interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- ✓ Level 1 Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- √ Level 2 Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- \checkmark Level 3 Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Group has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

j) Borrowings:

Borrowings are initially recognised at net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption amount is recognised in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method.

k) Borrowing costs:

General and specific borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are capitalised during the period of time that is required to complete and prepare the asset for its intended use or sale. Qualifying assets are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale.

Other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

I) Provisions and contingent liabilities:

Provisions for legal claims, volume discounts and returns are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses. The carrying amounts of provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period. The discount rate used to determine the present value is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

A disclosure for contingent liabilities is made where there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may probably not require an outflow of resources or an obligation for which the future outcome cannot be ascertained with reasonable certainty. When there is a possible or a present obligation where the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

m) Revenue recognition:

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of returns, trade allowances, rebates, value added taxes and amounts collected on behalf of third parties. The Group recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity.

Sale of goods -

Timing of recognition: Sales are recognised when substantial risk and rewards of ownership are transferred to customer. In case of domestic sales take place when goods are dispatched or delivery is handed over to customer's logistics. In case of export sales take place when goods are shipped on-board, based on bill of lading.



Interest income:

Interest income from a financial asset is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the amount of income can be measured reliably.

Dividend income:

Dividend income is recognised when the Group's right to receive the payment has been established.

n) Employee Benefits:

The Group provides following post-employment plans: (i) Defined benefit plans such as gratuity and pension & (ii) Defined contribution plans such as Provident fund

a) Defined-benefit plan:

The liability or asset recognised in the balance sheet in respect of defined benefit pension and gratuity plan is the present value of defined benefit obligations at the end of the reporting period less fair value of the plan assets. The defined benefit obligations is calculated annually by actuaries using the projected unit credit method.

The Group recognises the following changes in the net defined benefit obligation as an expense in the consolidated statement of profit and loss:

 (a) Service costs comprising current service costs, pastservice costs, gains and losses on curtailment and nonroutine settlements; and

(b) Net interest expense or income

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and fair value of the plan assets. This cost is included in employee benefit expenses in the consolidated statement of the profit & loss

Re-measurement comprising of actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustment and changes in actuarial assumptions, the effect of asset excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability and the return on plan assets (excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability) ceiling are recognised in the period in which they occur directly in Other comprehensive income. Re-measurement are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods.

b) Defined-contribution plan:

Under defined contribution plans, provident fund, the Group pays pre-defined amounts to separate funds and does not have any legal or informal obligation to pay additional sums. These comprise of contributions to the employees' provident fund with the government, superannuation fund and certain state plans like Employees' State Insurance and Employees' Pension Scheme. The Group's payments to the defined contribution plans are recognised as expenses during the period in which the employees perform the services that the payment covers.

c) Other employee benefit

Compensated absences which are not expected to occur within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employee renders the related services are recognised as a liability at the present value of the obligation as at the Balance sheet date based on an actuarial valuation.

o) Foreign Currency Transaction:

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian rupee (INR), which is Group's functional and presentation currency. Foreign exchange differences regarded as an adjustment to borrowing costs are presented in the statement of profit and loss, within finance costs. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented.

At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined.

p) Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current tax expense and the net change in the deferred tax asset or liability during the year. Current and deferred taxes are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in such case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is measured at the amount of tax expected to be payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Deferred income tax is recognised using the Balance Sheet approach. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible and taxable temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and liabilities and their carrying amount, except when the deferred income tax arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss at the time of the transaction.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that either future taxable profits or reversal of deferred tax liabilities will be available, against which the deductible temporary differences and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset shall be reviewed at the end of each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period and are expected to apply when the related deferred tax asset is realised or the deferred tax liability is settled.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are off set when there is a legally enforceable right to off set current tax assets and liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority.

Minimum Alternative Tax ('MAT') credit is recognised as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Group will pay normal income-tax during the specified period. In the year in which the MAT credit becomes eligible to be recognised as an asset, the said asset is created by way of a credit to the statement of profit and loss. The Group reviews the same at each balance sheet date and writes down the carrying amount of MAT credit entitlement to the extent there is no longer convincing evidence to the effect that Group will pay normal income-tax during the specified period.



q) Segment Reporting

The Group has identified its Managing Director as the Chief Operating Decision Maker. Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to managing director of the Group. The Managing Director evaluates the Group's performance and allocates resources as a whole.

r) Research and Development:

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Product development costs are expensed as incurred unless technical and commercial feasibility of the project is demonstrated, further economic benefits are probable, the Group has an intention and ability to complete and use or sell the product and the costs can be measured reliably.

s) Earnings Per Share:

Basic EPS is arrived at based on net profit or (loss) after taxation available to equity shareholders to the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

The diluted EPS is calculated on the same basis as basic EPS, after adjusting for the effects of potential dilutive equity shares unless impact is anti-dilutive.

t) Recent Accounting Pronouncements:

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standard or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. On March 31, 2023, MCA amended the Companies (Indian

Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 by issuing the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2023, applicable from April 1, 2023, as below:

Ind AS 1 – Presentation of Financial Statements

The amendments require companies to disclose their material accounting policies rather than their significant accounting policies. Accounting policy information, together with other information, is material when it can reasonably be expected to influence decisions of primary users of general purpose financial statements.

Ind AS 12 - Income Taxes

The amendments clarify how companies account for deferred tax on transactions such as leases and decommissioning obligations. The amendments narrowed the scope of the Initial recognition exemption of Ind AS 12 so that it no longer applies to transactions that, on initial recognition, give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences. Accordingly, companies will need to recognise a deferred tax asset and a deferred tax liability for temporary differences arising on transactions such as initial recognition of a lease and a decommissioning provision.

Ind AS 8 - Accounting Policies

Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

The definition of a "change in accounting estimates" has been replaced with a definition of "accounting estimates". Accounting estimates are defined as "monetary amounts in financial statements that are subject to measurement uncertainty". Entities develop accounting estimates if accounting policies require items in financial statements to be measured in a way that involves measurement uncertainty
